Cripple Creek, Colo., Jan. 5.—Deputy Dist. Atty. C. A. Gillette today filed information in the district court charg-ing Harry Orchard with the murder of J. W. Hartsock, one of the M men killed in the Independence depot ex-plosion on June 6, 1904. The informa-tion is based on an affidavit made by Sheriff Edward Bell. Orchard is un-der arrest at Caldwell, Ida., charged with the asassingtion of forbar Gay der arrest at Caldwell, Ida., charged with the asassination of forther Gov. It was a remarkable journey.
