## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Alumni at Banquet**—The local Iowa State College Alumni association, will hold its second annual banquet at the Cullen hotel on the evening of Feb. 13.

**Scandinavian Ball**—A ball will be given in the Pioneer stake hall under the auspices of the presidencies of the Scandinavian meetings of this city, on Tuesday, Feb. 26, to which Scandinavians are cordially invited.

**Two Homes Planned**—Architect R. M. Taylor has completed plans for an \$8,000 residence for Dr. R. E. Steele at Seventh East street and Princeton Avenue, also a \$4,500 store building for Charles Tye at Sixth Ave. and E street.

**Death of Susan Gatehouse**—Mrs. Susan Gatehouse, one of the old time residents of this city, died at her residence, 631 West Third North street, yesterday. Mrs. Gatehouse came to Utah 47 years ago, and has lived in Salt Lake almost ever since. She was married to William Gatehouse, October 2, 1864. She is survived by three children: Mrs. E. V. Johnson, Mrs. Sadie Larson, and C. F. Gatehouse. No arrangements for the funeral have been made.

**Episcopalists in Utah**—The Living Church Annual just issued gives the following statistics for the past year of the Protestant Episcopal church in the missionary district of Utah: Clergy, 12; parishes and missions, 19; lay readers, 8; baptisms, 127; confirmed, 87; communicants, 1,075; last reported, 985; increase, 80; marriages, 40; burials, 75; Sunday school teachers, 74; scholars, 451; contributions, \$23,092.48.

**To Add to Wasatch School**—The board of education has purchased from H. Hodgson a strip of land on First avenue and R street for \$3,000. The deal put the board into possession of the west half of the block, and it is the intention to build thereon an addition to the Wasatch school. If the plans are carried out the extension will consist of 12 rooms, including a manual training department. The whole to cost approximately \$53,000. Work will be started at the earliest possible time.

**UNDERWRITERS AT BANQUET**  
Legislation Needed in Insurance Circles is Discussed.

The Utah Association of Life Underwriters held its fourth annual banquet Saturday night, when it was decided to ask the legislature for a codification of the insurance laws, increasing the rights of the state to control all the insurance of the state by the appointment of a commissioner of insurance, the creation of an insurance department in the state, and a continuance of the tax of 1 1/2 per cent of the gross premium collected upon the insurance now written within the state, a law which is now in force.

A letter was read from President Edwards of the National Association of Life Underwriters advising the removal of any taxation upon life premiums. The banquet was largely attended, and among the speakers were Governor Burr on the "Necessity of New Insurance Legislation," "Insurance Situation," Colonel George B. Squires, "Uniform Laws," E. C. Ashton, and some informal remarks by Mayor John S. Bradford. Judge W. H. King was toastmaster.

## INSPECTION DATES FOR STATE TROOPS

General Wedgwood Suggests Time When Affair Might Take Place.

FOR LATTER PART OF MARCH.

Twelve Organizations and Headquarters Now Compose the National Guard of Utah.

Adjutant General E. A. Wedgwood has submitted to the war department a suggestion of the dates upon which the various organizations of the National Guard of Utah might be inspected by an officer of the regular army in conformity with the provisions of the Dick Bill. This inspection is an annual affair and is conducted to inform the war department of the comparative efficiency of the militia organizations of the various states. The provisions of the bill require that for each senator and representative in Congress, the states must show 100 men, meaning that for this inspection 300 men must be shown to enable Utah to participate in the annual inspection by Congress for the maintenance of the militia. This money is used for equipping the troops and for expenses incidental to the camps of instruction held each year, thus lessening the burden of the state in this regard.

In the National Guard of Utah, an increased showing in efficiency has resulted each succeeding year, last year having established records in both phases. General Wedgwood is hopeful that this year may see an addition to the number of men heretofore shown, and that increased efficiency will also be shown the inspector.

MAY DETAIL MAJOR MAY.

Though no detail has been made, it is believed that the annual inspection will be made by Maj. May, Fifteenth Infantry, who inspected the Utah troops last year for the war department. It has heretofore been the policy of the department to detail the same officer for the inspections in order that comparisons might be made between the showings of the various years. Major May still being stationed at Fort Douglas, it is likely that he will again be the officer detailed for this duty.

**SWINDLING RAILROAD MAN.**

Three Men are Now in Jail to Answer For Their Game.

Three men who worked a scheme to rob an employee of the U. P. at Rawlins, Wyo., on the 15th of this month, are securely locked in jail. Two of them are behind the bars at Ogden and the third was arrested at Salt Lake by Detective Chase and Burt, assisted by Officer Hart of the U. P. and Officer Burke of the Ogden department.

The men are known as F. C. Showers and George Shovers, alias Roberts, and E. J. Hill. George Shovers greatly resembles a man named Blizard who works for the Union Pacific. On Jan. 19 he called at the office at Rawlins, represented himself as Blizard and secured his check for \$4. He was arrested in the work by his brother, F. C. Showers, and Hill.

Officers Burke and Hart arrested Hill in Ogden and located George Shovers in Rawlins. They learned that the other Showers had come to Salt Lake and notified the local authorities. Detective Chase and Burt found the man on the streets and placed him under arrest. He will be taken back to Ogden to answer the charge of forgery.
