## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Going to Ogden—Gov. Culler and staff will attend the United Commercial Travelers' outing at Ogden on June 8.

Class Day Postponed—The daughters of the Confederacy have postponed their class day from June 3 to July 4.

Invitations Out—The faculty of Rowland Hall has issued invitations for the twenty-fifth annual commencement exercises of the institution, for the week beginning Thursday, June 7.

L. D. S. U. Alumni—The L. D. S. University alumni will hold their annual reunion in Memorial Hall this evening, to be followed by dancing in the gymnasium, and a banquet in the basement of Barratt hall.

Many Inquiries—Manager Place of the Manufacturers and Merchants' association, has received inquiries as to Salt Lake's business prospects from southern California, Illinois, Nebraska, Colorado and Massachusetts.

Can Not Attend—An invitation has been received by Gov. Culler to attend the "Golden Jubilee" of the Republican party at Philadelphia from June 17 to 26. It will be impossible for the governor to attend hence he has sent his regrets.

Deseret Captured—Private William B. Swank of the Twelfth Light battery, who deserted on the march to Fort Russell, was captured in this city last evening, by Policeman Shannon of this city, and delivered to the authorities at Fort Douglas.

Dean Brewster Here—Dean Brewster of St. Mark's parish arrived yesterday afternoon with his wife and two children, after a 10 years' residence at Colorado Springs. He is a Yale 1882 graduate, and prior to coming west was located at South Orange, N. J.

Inspected Tunnel—Engineer Sanders of the reclamation service has been inspecting the Gunnison tunnel, near Montrose, Colo., where a linear advance of 1,356 feet was made in May, and 825 men are employed. The tunnel will turn the Gunnison river into the Uncompahgre valley and irrigate 140,000 acres.

Brought Good Report—Col. O. P. Chisholm of Bozeman, Mont., is at the Wilson to visit with his brother W. W. Chisholm, the well known mining man. The colonel reports a fine winter in western Montana, and that crops will be the best in many years. Livestock are at their best, and high prices for wools have prevailed.

New Plumbing Concern—A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Davis County Plumbing and Electrical Supply company, which has been filed in the secretary of state's office. Its capital stock is \$5,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. The incorporators are J. H. Robinson, Dan Mulrind and David Stoker.

W. J. McIntyre Dead—William J. McIntyre, the well known manager of the Salt Lake Soda Water company, died suddenly in Denver, at the age of 42, and leaving a wife and two sons. Mrs. McIntyre was with him. Mr. McIntyre has been in poor health for the last six months, and had gone to Denver hoping the change would benefit him.

Articles Filed—The Cannon-Taylor company of this city filed its articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office yesterday. The company will engage in the general mercantile business. Its capital stock is \$25,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each. Brigham T. Cannon is president; J. L. Taylor, vice president; Joseph J. Cannon, secretary and treasurer.

Italians Arrested—George and Nick Andrews, two Italians who have been working on the Big Cottonwood canal, were arrested yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriffs Andrew Smith and Ike Emery upon the charge of obtaining money by false pretense. It is charged that the men stole a check belonging to another workman on the conduit for \$22.50 and cashed the same. The check had previously been endorsed by the rightful owner.

## PLANNING FOR PIE.

American Party Managers Expect to Extend Their Conquests.

The American organ announces with flamboyant flare that there was a secret meeting of the party leaders last night at the office of State Chairman Snyder. It refers to the gathering as being a "rousing" one, though it gives only one other name in addition to that of Snyder, and that is County Chairman Darmer.

It is stated further that "the machinery was put in motion" for a great campaign throughout the state, and that it is proposed to sweep all obstacles before it. The Republicans are to be thrown over a precipice and dashed to pieces, and the Democrats are to be sunk in mid-ocean with millstones around their necks. It is gravely stated that an American party ticket will be nominated in at least 14 counties of the state, and that complete organizations and campaign committees will be put to work in the near future.

## ANOTHER REMOVAL.

Fire Chief Goes Back on Promise and "Fires" William M. Morrison.

At the committee meetings of the city council last night the fire committee decided to report favorably upon the appointment of Charles Sheeley as superintendent of the fire alarm system to succeed William M. Morrison, whose resignation was requested "for the good of the service," as Chief Vall expressed it. Morrison appeared before the committee last night and explained his side of the controversy. He said that he told the chief he was willing to resign, but he thought he should be allowed 10 days' vacation first, and then he would hand in his resignation to take effect on June 1. The chief agreed to that, but afterwards changed his mind, and requested his resignation at once. The committee, however, decided to sustain the chief, and will recommend the confirmation of Sheeley.

The municipal laws committee will report favorably upon the Black ordinance which provides for a board of examiners of plumbers in this city. The board will consist of two journeymen plumbers, two boss plumbers and the city plumbing inspector, all to be appointed by the mayor. It will be necessary for all plumbers who desire to work in this city to apply to the board for a certificate and be examined as to his qualifications. The certificate fee to be paid by the applicant will be \$2. The board will meet once a month and its members will receive \$4 per day for each day actually employed in their work.

The finance committee decided to recommend the purchase of a horse and buggy for the city inspector of the board of public works at a cost of \$225. Martin opposed the proposition, but the other members of the committee favored it, so the purchase will be made.
