Various kinds of trees have been recommended but to my mind the best kind of shade tree is the Horse Chestnut. It is a magnificent tree of heavy foliage, tolerable quick growth, cone shaped, and has a beautiful bloom in spring. It gives out a delightful perfume, flowers in any climate or soil. I see by an agricultural report that many of the best trees in the plantations of the deserts of Arabia and are doing well. By order of the Pacific states are planting a certain number yearly. They have noted the rainfall which has been considerably increased. The timber being of large size when matured is of value as furniture timber. If you think this worth notice, please publish and advise me.
