

change be made, it will be due to the influence of Bismarck, who, it is asserted, made representations unfavorable to Count Tallier.

General Chansey, while in Berlin, interviewed Bismarck. The latter, it is said, declared he in no way feared the contingency of Gambetta's return to power, as he recognized in him not only a great orator but also a great patriot, who loved his country too sincerely to launch it upon adventures which might end fatally.

LONDON, 15.—A dispatch from Kairwan says: All the inhabitants are disarmed. The quartering of French troops in a number of mosques and colleges has given great offense to the Tunisians. General Logro strongly objected to the projected march to Gabez, and thence to Susa, and only prepared to start on receiving stringent orders from Paris. The route lies through a difficult and mountainous country, where operations will be almost impossible after the rains, which were already begun. It is impossible to describe the unpopularity of the expedition among all ranks. It is openly denounced as a waste of lives. The French officers contemplate the wholesale resignation of their commission at the close of the campaign. The construction of the railway from Susa to Kairwan will probably be stopped by the rains.

Fever and dysentery continue among the troops to an alarming extent.

The documents seized in connection with the arrest of Tobin the Fenian, relate to the establishment by force of arms of an Irish republic. They reveal the existence of an organization known as the Royal Irish Republican Society, with numerous members. The books, rules and a list of members of the society are likely to throw light on the existence of similar organizations.

ST. PETERSBURG, 15.—Before the coronation of the Czar it is proposed to dispose of all political prisoners now in jail, estimated at from 50 to 60 of both sexes, implicated in Nihilistic and Socialistic propaganda in the last six years. The first trials will be of negligent police officials. Other offenders will be tried in three batches. Some of the most deeply implicated will be dealt with by administrative order, without trial. Arrests are frequently made, throwing light on the doings of those already in custody.

The trial of the 22 Nihilists has been simplified. First Lieutenant Soukanhoff has acknowledged the truth of the charge against him. He states that the dynamite used to blow up Sadove Street was taken by him from the naval powder magazine.

ROME, 15.—The official Gazette publishes a statement relating to the visit of King Humbert to Vienna. It says the splendor of the fetes given in his honor will astonish no one who is acquainted with the traditional magnificence of the House of Hapsburg. It refers to the extreme cordiality and affection shown King Humbert. The manifestation in Italy, it says, on the return of King Humbert showed plainly that his visit to Vienna was a practical fulfillment of the desire for peace, and the sentiment of sympathy already existing in the hearts of the inhabitants of both countries, who rivalled one another in their demonstrations of satisfaction at this affirmation of a closer friendship between Rome and Vienna.

MADRID, 16.—Castellar in his speech in the Cortes, yesterday, maintained that his attitude toward the Government was consistent with his past history and antecedents. Much as he had sacrificed to the revolution, he would do it again under the same circumstances, but he now believed the more certain means to accomplish the triumph of the democrats was by a legal struggle, as in France and in America by President and Parliament. The final part of his speech was a denunciation of ultra-montane efforts to induce the Spanish Government to interfere with Italian politics and favor a temporal power through the Papacy and its intrigues and manifestations in support of the Carlists. In describing the various forms of government, in tones deep with emotion, that rang through the house and galleries, he alluded thus to President Garfield. How can we forget that noble chief of a free people, who fell at the post of honor, a martyr to duty, after an honorable and brave career, an example of republican fortitude, torn by the hand of the cowardly assassin from his devoted wife, his loving children and his true colleagues and that great nation. He then passed to the question of education, when he said, sciences and

learning must be free from state and church tyranny. A professional and learned man must soar freely in pursuit of truth beyond the reach of fanaticism and despotism, which lead as in Russia to nihilism and regicide. His pathetic peroration was on the necessity of progress and liberty, combined with the mutual benevolence of liberalism and democracy. The speaker was cheered by the galleries and crowds in the streets cheered him enthusiastically. After the session Castellar's house was crowded with politicians of all ranks and shades. In the Chamber of Deputies to-day, W. Canovas Del Castillo criticized the action of the ministry in regard to the Saida massacre. He argued that foreigners were entitled to compensation for their losses during the Spanish civil wars. Alluding to the late Morocco conference, he maintained that the Emperor of Morocco must not be allowed to disappear when the period of its collapse arrived. Spain should be ready to defend certain positions, including deserted villages. The opposition to carrying out the destiny of Spain and Africa was not at the Straits of Gibraltar, but at the Pyrenees. He concluded by defending his conservative policy.

BERLIN, 16. At the meeting of Bismarck and the Emperor the former expressed a wish for the Crown Prince to be present in order to discuss the present situation, and in order that he might have a voice in deciding upon the policy to be pursued. The Emperor expressed a wish for the restoration of peace between the Catholic Church and the State.

PARIS, 16.—Count De St. Valiere and Gen. Chausey, ambassadors at Berlin, and St. Petersburg respectively have resigned.

Correspondence.

BEAVER, November 8, 1881.

Editor Deseret News:

The September term of the Second District Court was rather monotonous, hence I did not write you, besides, I believe every case was noticed in the local papers. I might have said something about what the Beaver Enterprise called "The Celebrated Case," Hutchings against Blackner & Gentry. The important points in this case are that the defendants, who might have settled the matter for \$25 without going to law, have run it up to perhaps \$500 or more, and the end is not yet. Their attorneys, who are early settlers in Utah, being unable, after allowing their time for appeal to the District Court to run out, and being beaten in three justices' courts, finally got the case before Judge Twiss, on grounds of jurisdiction of city justices in civil cases, and the validity of city charters in Utah. The main grounds of argument were that as city charters are not mentioned in the Organic Act the Legislature had no right to grant the charter. The next ground was, that as the justice was elected for the city, he could act only as a police magistrate, the city charter to the contrary notwithstanding. Various authorities were cited pro and con. The Constitution of the United States and organic act, provide for justices of the peace and say that their jurisdiction shall be "as limited by law." This of course leaves the matter with the Legislature with the only restriction that their laws must not conflict with the Constitution of the United States or the Organic Act of the Territory. The last named act in section six provides that the Legislature shall have the power to legislate on all rightful subjects of legislation except the primary disposal of the soil, taxing non-residents higher than residents or taxing property belonging to the United States Government. These are the only exceptions. As no one can doubt that city charters and jurisdiction of justices are rightful subjects of legislation and not prohibited, it is, I think, clear that the justice had jurisdiction. To take away Beaver City charter or annul it on the foregoing grounds would be to invalidate every charter in the Territory, and to oust the Justice of jurisdiction on the grounds alleged would be to oust every other city justice.

The smallest cities are allowed two justices of the peace, either of which outside of Salt Lake and two or three other cities, could do four times the amount of legal business required, both civil and criminal. The ruling of the court is reserved

for the first day of the December term. I leave further comment until a decision is reached, and will only add, that thus far his Honor has given the fullest satisfaction to law-abiding citizens, and we have no doubt the rights of the people will be sustained.
