WESTERN NOTES.

Scrutiny has reached San Bernardino. Bailey is already two feet high around Los Angeles.

The California Legislature has passed a "no fence" law, to take effect June 23.

Los Angeles county, Cal., owes for gopher and squirrel damage the sum of \$10,000, and yet the varmints are as thick as ever. 206,287 have been captured and skinned.

The farmers along the South Yamhill, Oregon, have eluded to gather and raised funds for the extermination of wolves, making the prize \$22 for each scalp.

The Carson Appeal compels California for having adopted the No-Fence law. The Nevada Legislature will, at its next session, enact a similar law for that State.

They complain in Los Angeles that the California Legislature has taken advantage of the present low rates of fare between the two places to send their tranquility city to a state of alarm.

This week we add another discovery of our natural wealth, being a coal mine found in the same vicinity on Friday last by Desiderio Busta, who is now in the vicinity of the mine, and in length 150 feet and plainly visible."

Senator Jones, of Nevada, says the San Francisco Post has not opened his mouth since he took his seat in the Senate, but it seems that he is engaged upon a work which will be of more benefit to the Pacific coast than if he was to make a big speech every day for six years. He proposes to turn the Colorado river into the desert, and make a vast lake of what is now a dry plain. The gigantic changes caused by the presence of this body of water would cover with verdure the parched plains of southern California, and the Nevada coast and the cultivation of millions of acres now useless to man.

The Sutter Creek Independent of January 25th says: "A gentleman recently brought some very rich specimens of gold-bearing quartz to John Deane's of Plymouth to be assayed. He stated that he has discovered a ledge of the rock somewhere in the vicinity of Plymouth, but his whereabouts is unknown. The owner of some newly located mines between Nashville and Plymouth have lately found some very rich quartz in their claims. These mines are upon the Mother Lode, and a further development may prove them to be of great value."
