**CHANGING TIME.**—By reference to the advertisement of the Utah Central Railroad, it will be seen that in addition to the usual morning and afternoon trains from this city to Ogden, an accommodation train will leave this city daily at 4:30 p.m., Sundays excepted, instead of Sundays, Wednesdays and Saturdays as heretofore. In addition to these an accommodation train will run on the same days from Ogden to this city, leaving there daily at 9 a.m.

**THE IMMIGRATION.**—The company of Salt Lake City, who arrived on the 7th inst., reported Ogden at one o'clock this afternoon. Those whose destination is south of the city will come to Salt Lake City by the evening's regular train. Those intending to stay in Ogden or settle in the northern counties of the Territory will not be brought to this city, as was the case with the former companies of immigrants who reached here at the time the people of Ogden were suffering from the existence of Small Pox in their midst.

AFTERNOON DISPATCHES.

A TREMENDOUS FLOOD!

THE CROWN PRINCE OF PRUSSIA COMPLETELY ROUTED BY THE FRENCH!

CALIFORNIA.

Severe Storm.  
SAN FRANCISCO, 30.—There was a severe gale with lightning, last night. A number of vessels put back to shore. A stranger went ashore near Santa Cruz and is probably a total loss.

VIRGINIA.

Extraordinary Floods.  
RICHMOND.—There has been an unprecedented freshet at Lynchburg. The bridge across the James river, a quarter of a mile long, was washed away. The depots, of the Orange and Alexandria railroads, are submerged; also the canal is flooded and the boats are drifting through the lower streets. The city main gas pipe was washed out last night and Lynchburg was suddenly left in total darkness. A large number of buildings were swept away. The gas and water works are submerged and houses, from the country above, have been floating by all night. A dispatch states that the mouth of the Anna river is flooding all the surrounding country; houses, cattle, etc., are floating down the stream this morning.

NEW YORK.

Prussians defeated.  
The World's special, from Ostend, says intense excitement has been caused here, this evening, by the arrival of a special messenger from Valenciennes, bringing the news of a great battle fought on the Seine on the 27th, which resulted in the complete defeat of the Crown Prince of Prussia, under the guns of Mont Valerien. The victory was followed by the evacuation of Versailles and Rambouillet. The Crown Prince is retreating rapidly northward upon the army of the King at Meaux and Soissons.
