EASTERN.

BALTIMORE, 3.—Mrs. Mary Ann

Sample, aged 72, was found dead in

her room last night, brutally murdered.

TROY.—Cook & Van Valkenburg's

collar factory was entirely and some

NEW YORK.—Fourteen bids for gold
