How Harriman is Dividing Up Among His Various Big Systems.

Contrary to the report that a com-promise had been effected in New York between the Keene and Harriman in-terests, and that the Southern Pacific rallway suit had been settled, a brief containing sensational allegations was filed at Cincinnati, O., on June 19, by counsel for the appellants. The original suit involved the question of a right of the Union Pacific directors to vote at the stockholders' meeting of the South-ern Pacific. The Harriman interests. h represent the Union and Central Pacific roads, had obtained a controlling iterest in the Southern Pacific and at he annual election to have been held ast April expected to control the meet. ng and elect their officials. njunction was begun by the Keene inrests, representing the Southern cific, the action going to the United States court of appeals at Cincinati from the Louisville district. The bilef filed on June 19 was prepared by Senator Foraker of Cincinnati, Asgustus E. Wilson of Louisville, Edward Lauter-bach of New York, and Eugene Tread-well of New York.
