MARTIN'S SCHEME.

Suggests That City Construct Conduit And Lease Privileges to Corporations.

City Councilman L. D. Martin has suggested a scheme to City Engineer Kelsey which he claims will be the means of an income for the city from means of an income for the city from public utility corporations. He sug-gests that the city construct a con-duit seven feet deep at the curb line on all the principal streets of the city for the use of all corporations for plac-ing their wires or pipes underground. The city could charge the corporations using the conduit a fixed fee and thus resive an income which Mr. Martin claims would be about 50 per cent per year on the cost of the conduit.
