A DEFINITE location having been re-

 the General Land Office of the boundary

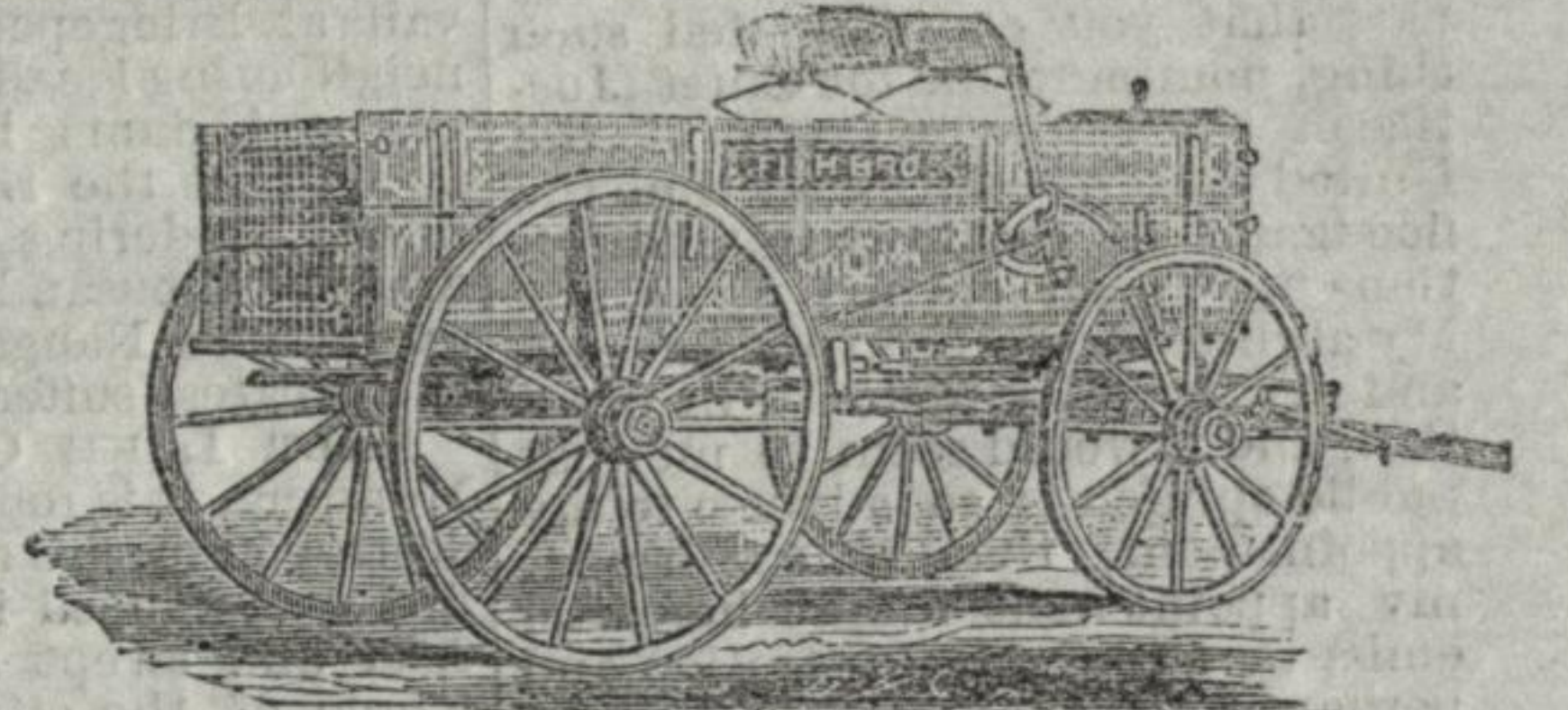
