

been received for truth in the Christian world, and this disposition seemed to increase. The Apostle Paul in writing to the Saints in his day advised them to "beware lest any man spoiled them through philosophy and vain deceit, after the rudiments of the world and not after Christ." That same advice was good for people in our own times. If we had received the doctrines of Christ, if our feet were planted firmly upon the rock which he had laid, there was no fear of our going astray, but if we departed from that and walked in the ways of men, and were led by their theories and speculations and their vain philosophy, we were very likely to go astray. He (the speaker) had noticed in reading some of the works of modern divines, and in noting the progress of religious thought among the people, that there was a doctrine becoming very wide spread among people called Christians, that was in regard to our condition in the future. It was believed by a great many people in the present day that there was no such thing as a literal resurrection of the body; that after this body was laid away in the ground and had crumbled into the elements out of which it had been organized, that that was the end of the body. They did not see any need of a literal resurrection, they could not perceive by what process it could be resurrected, and not being able to comprehend how this great change can come, how the scattered elements could be brought together again, they rejected the doctrine altogether. This was a doctrine of the people called spiritualists or spiritists, that strong delusion which the Lord had permitted to come into the world because men would not receive the truth, but turned away from it. It was taught by this tapping and muttering influence that the release of the spirit from the body was the resurrection, that the body would be raised no more, but that the spirit liberated from the body would progress from sphere to sphere—how many spheres they did not know—but the body would not come up again. This idea seemed to be increasing in the minds of the people, among the various Christian sects, and some of the greatest preachers and divines of the day entertained it and taught it to their congregations.

Now the Latter day Saints had the satisfaction of knowing in regard to this as well as other tenets of their faith, that the ideas they entertained in relation to these points had come from God. There was no need for any doubt or speculation. The Lord had revealed something concerning this. Not the manner in which the resurrection should be brought about, the Lord had not revealed the philosophy of it in full, he had only given us some ideas concerning it, but he had made the fact very plain, clear and distinct that there might be no misunderstanding about it. In the Book of Doctrine and Covenants—which contains many of the revelations that God had given to the church through the Prophet Joseph Smith—this doctrine was laid down in great plainness. That the spirit and the body make up the soul of man, and that the resurrection from the dead is the redemption of the soul; that there are material elements and spiritual elements; that the spiritual part was in the beginning with God, and that only when the spiritual and material elements are inseparably connected could a fullness of joy be received. The revelation said: "Spirit and element inseparably connected receiveth a fullness of joy, otherwise man cannot receive a fullness of joy." The Book of Mormon was also very plain upon this subject. The speaker proceeded to read passages from the 79th page (new edition) of the Book of Mormon, which went to show that the spirits of men, the righteous and the wicked, would be brought up from the place to which they had gone when they departed this life. Hell must deliver up its captive spirits, Paradise must deliver up the spirits of the righteous, and the grave must deliver up its captive bodies, both of the wicked and of the righteous, that the spirits might be joined to the bodies again. The speaker also quoted the 40th chapter of the Book of Alma (page 352 new edition), showing what an angel had communicated to Alma on the subject, namely, that there is a space between death and the resurrection, and that at the resurrection the body would be brought up, and spirit and body would be joined together, and that not one part of the body would be lost. The very meaning of the word resurrection ought to dispel

the notion that the separation of the spirit from the body at death was resurrection. The word itself meant, "I stand up again." The idea which all the apostles and prophets of old had in regard to this subject was that at some future time the voice of God should be uttered and that the dead should stand up again, as shown forth in the Book of Mormon. The speaker next quoted from the 7th, 14th and 19th chapters of the Book of Job; also the 26th of Isaiah, the 37th of Ezekiel, and 12th chapter of Daniel, all of which passages were emphatic on the doctrine of a literal resurrection. He furthermore referred to the resurrection of the Savior, which was a clear proof of the body and spirit being brought together; quoted liberally from the New Testament to prove that the Apostles labored not to prove the immortality of the soul, but the resurrection of the body, and showed that on this doctrine the Bible, the Book of Mormon and the Doctrine and Covenants were in perfect harmony. Reasoned on the philosophy of the resurrection and the necessity of a union of the grosser elements with the spiritual in the immortal man, that he might be able to receive from all heights and depths the pleasures and joys of the entire universe. And closed with an exhortation to obedience to the gospel, by which alone a right could be obtained to a part in the first resurrection.
