

COURT NEWS.

TWO DIVORCE SUITS.

Wives Complain That Husbands Have Deserted Them.

Charging her husband with desertion and failure to provide, Mary E. Walberg this morning filed an action in the Third district court asking for divorce from her husband, Gustave Oscar Walberg. The parties were married at Salt Lake City, March 25, 1889, and have five children, the oldest of whom is 24 years old and the youngest 11 years. Plaintiff claims that since February, 1905, defendant has refused to support her, although amply able to do so. She asks for decree of divorce, reasonable alimony and attorneys' fees.

Laura E. Stewart today filed suit in the Third district court for divorce from Percy Stewart, her husband, charging him with desertion and failure to provide. Defendant in the case waives service of summons and consents that default be entered, and the case will come up for action before Judge Morse this afternoon at the regular divorce matinee.

The Stewarts were married Oct. 11, 1904, at Colorado City, Colo., and plaintiff asserts that for more than a year past defendant has failed to supply her with the necessities of life. She also asks to be restored to her maiden name, Laura E. Reed.

ENGINEER IS KILLED.

J. J. Mullen Meets Death in Wreck on Burlington in Wyoming.

Butte, Mont., June 25.—A special dispatch to the Miner from Sheridan, Wyo., says: Burlington passenger train No. 42, due here at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, was wrecked near Gerry Owen, a small station just south of the Custer battlefield in Montana, and Engineer J. J. Mullen was instantly killed. Fireman George W. Dukeshire was seriously injured, but it is believed he will recover.

The wreck was caused by a defective rail, the engine jumping the track and landing in the ditch, carrying with it a number of coaches. The passengers were severely shaken up.

ESPEE OPENS UP.

Shops at Sparks to Be Operated in Full Force Again.

Reno, Nev., June 25.—Asst. Supt. Rowlands of the Salt Lake division of the Southern Pacific, announced today that after July 1 all the departments at Sparks will be operated in full force. This means the employment of several hundred men who have been on half time for several months. It also means many additional freight trains will run out of Sparks and the employment of more shop and roundhouse heads at this point.

SUES AUTO OWNER.

Melvin A. White has entered suit for \$2,000 damages in the Third district court against Walter G. Filer and Bert Johnson, for damages which White claims he suffered by reason of being knocked down and run over by an automobile. The accident happened on April 2, at the corner of Main and First South street, and White says he was badly bruised and believes his eyesight has been permanently injured. Filer is the owner of the machine which did the damage, and Johnson is the chauffeur.

SUIT FOR SALARY.

Trouble Between University Professors Being Heard in Court.

Trial was commenced this morning in Judge Lewis' court of the case of Ira D. Cardiff against R. V. Chamberlain, in which the plaintiff sues to recover the sum of \$499 alleged to be the amount of damages suffered by him in the performance of a contract between himself and defendant. Cardiff claims that he came to Utah at the request and promise of defendant that he should receive employment at the University of Utah at a certain salary, and when he came to settle found his salary was considerably less than what defendant had promised. The amount sued for is the difference in the amount promised and the sum received, according to the plaintiff's complaint.

GETS TWO YEARS.

Gus Kascacenes, who was convicted by a jury in Judge Armstrong's court on Wednesday of the crime of burglary in the second degree, appeared before his honor for sentence this morning, and was given two years in the state prison at hard labor.

Kascacenes was found guilty of having entered, on the 26th day of March last, the store of 531 west Second South street, belonging to S. Lavinsky, and extracting from same a quantity of goods.

VERDICT FOR PLAINTIFF.

A verdict for the plaintiff was rendered this morning in Judge Lewis' division of the Third district court in the case of J. C. Woodmansee against Peter Fobes in the sum of \$57.95. Dr. Woodmansee performed an operation upon a foreigner and Fobes went good for the payment, but a suit was necessary for the collection of the amount.

SUIT TRANSFERRED.

The case of James Lavelle, who filed a suit for damages against the Union Pacific Railroad company for \$20,000 in the district court at Ogden, has been transferred to the Third district court in this city. Lavelle was employed as a driver in the mines of the company at Rock Springs, and was the victim of
