ENGINEER IS KILLED.

J. J. Mullen Meets Death in Wreek on Burlington in Wyoming.

Burthe, Mont., June 25.—A special dis-patch to the Miner from Sheridan, Wyo, says: Burlington passenger train No. 42, due here at 2:35 o'clock this aft-ernoon, was wrecked near Garry Owen, a small station just south of the Custer battlefield in Montana, and Engineer J. J. Mullen was instantly killed. Fire-man George W. Dukeshire was serious-ly injured, but it is believed he will re-cover.

The wreck was caused by a defective rail, the engine jumping the track and landing in the ditch, carrying with it a number of coaches. The passengers were severely shaken up.
