Ogden Junction, Oct. 12—

FUN OR INCENDIARISM?—Late last evening the inhabitants of the lower portion of the city were startled by a report similar to that of a cannon, and many greatly wondered what it was. It has since transpired that a car drawhead filled with gunpowder with a fuse attached had been buried near the U. P. freight house and the torpedo thus made set off last evening. There are strong suspicions that something more villainous than a practical joke and a little fun was meditated, as the impromptu torpedo was buried so close to the building as to suggest the possibility that the affair was an attempt at incendiaryism, and judging from the report not less than two or three pounds of powder was used. The party or parties connected with the affair seem to be keeping dark, which makes it look worse.

It is our painful duty to-day to announce the sudden death of Bishop A. H. Scott, of this city, who died at his residence in the 2nd Ward on last Sunday morning. His death was very unexpected and has cast a gloom over the entire city. Last Monday week the Bishop accidentally bruised one of his hands while engaged at work with his cider mill, but not paying much attention to it he still continued his work up to last Thursday, when in consequence of his swollen hand he was forced to cease labor and confine himself to the house. Erysipelas set in in the bruised arm and penetrated to the vital parts, which resulted in his death.

Bishop Scott is an old resident of Provo and was well known throughout the Territory as an unflinching faithful advocate of Mormonism, and his death is greatly lamented by his friends and the citizens of this county. He leaves a large family to mourn his loss. We deeply condole with the bereaved family, who have lost a true husband and a kind father.

The funeral services of the deceased took place this afternoon at the Meeting House. Addresses eulogizing, truthfully, the devoted life of our worthy Bishop were delivered by Bishop A. O. Smoot, Wm. Miller, Bishop J. P. R. Johnson and others. The body was borne to its last resting place by the largest procession of citizens, in carriages and wagons, ever known in this city.

The following motion to quash the indictment in the case of Mr. Wm. Fotheringham, indicted for the practice of plural marriage, has been filed in Judge Boreman's court:

for polygamy, 2 counts.

Now comes the above named defendant, Wm. Fotheringham, by his Attorneys, E. D. Hoge and Williams, Young, and Sheeks, and moves the Court to quash the first count in this indictment for the following reasons, to wit:

First, Because the time of the commission of the alleged offence in said count is indefinite.

Second, Because it does not lay any venue, as it does not name either County or District.

Third, That the venue, if alleged at all, shows that the alleged offence if committed by the defendant was committed out of the Second Judicial District, and the jurisdiction of this Court, and within the Third Judicial District of Utah Territory.

Fourth, Because it appears on the face of the indictment in said County that the supposed offence was not committed within two years before the finding of indictment herein.

Fifth, There was no statute of the United States making polygamy a crime at the time the said supposed offence is alleged in said count to have been committed by the defendant, and the said defendant by his Attorneys aforesaid comes and moves the court to quash the second count in said indictment for the reasons following:

First, Because there is no venue alleged in said count; there is no town, County, District or Territory named in the same.

Second, Because it appears on the face of the indictment and in said second count that the said supposed offence was not committed within the two years next preceding the finding of the indictment herein; and the said defendant, by his Attorneys aforesaid, moves the Court to quash the indictment in this cause, because it appears from the records of this Court that one Thomas Davis was duly drawn and summoned to serve as a Grand Juror for the term of Court when this indictment was found, and the records fail to show any reason why the said Davis was not empanelled and sworn as one of the Grand Jurors; and

Third, It does not appear from the record that said indictment was presented by the Grand Jury in open Court.

Fourth, Because the number of names, as appears from the record, previously designated by the Court to be drawn and summoned to serve as Grand Jurors, was twenty-three, and only fifteen were empanelled.

Fifth, Because said Grand Jurors were not drawn and empanelled in accordance with law.

Sixth, Because said indictment is in other respects uncertain and insufficient in law.
