It is only about one hundred years since the brutal punishment of pressing to death was abolished by law in Great Britain. It was supposed to be the penalty for felony, but any criminal who refused to plead either guilty or not guilty was condemned to it. The criminal condemned to be pressed was laid naked upon his back, and had iron laid upon him, as much as he could bear and more and more, being meantime fed upon bad bread and stagnant water until he either died or pleaded. In 1288 a man accused of murder in a small English town refused to plead and was pressed for an hour and three-quarter with mearly 400 weight of Iron, after which he pleaded not guilty, but was convicted and hanged.

PRESENCE OF ALLIED RACES VINDI-CATED.

The absence of weapons of war, or works of defence, other that such as are constituted by the selection of almost inaccessible localities; of temples or idols, of hieroglyphics or pictures, together with the durability and solidity of the dwellings, so different from anything to be found of the handlwark of existing uncivilized races of that region, and the wide extent of these ruins, which indicate the existence of allied races, covering large portions of the present territories of Arizona, New Mexico and Utah, as well as Northern Mexico, are the elements of the problems involved in the origin, history and disappearance of these races—problems which seem no nearer solution than when Coronado, nearly four hundred years ago, made a raid for the purpose of conquest among these places and through his priests gave to the world the first meagre accounts of them—then, as now, vacant and ruined.


