Choked Cattle.

There is often a great deal of trouble experienced in moving an animal that is choked by getting an apple, potato, or other vegetable stuck in the throat, or other article of food stuck in the esophagus. The usual way is to force it down the throat, where it has refused to go. This is very violent, and is apt to injure the gutlet. In the case of softer vegetables, as an apple or potato, we have seen the suggestion made to find the location of the object, place a block against it on one side, and lift a sharp blow on the other side with a mallet, thus crushing the obstructive article. This, too, seems rather violent, and must cause more or less soreness. A more humane and gentle method is suggested by some, who say it works well. It is to feel along the gutlet till the location of the obstructive object is found, and then begin to gently squeeze the gutlet and force the article upward toward the mouth and through the passage, where it is found. If the animal's head can be dropped a little it will help the operation, and soon the object of trouble passes into the animal's mouth without injury. This method is certainly worth trying.—*Mercur and Farmer.*

Magnesium.

Magnesium is one-third lighter than aluminum, and at the same time denser, and harder and tougher. Cost of a Buffalo Head.

Two years ago a good buffalo head sold for \$15 to \$20. The price now ranges from \$75 to \$100. There has not been a good buffalo head in Denver for three years. But it is expected that Buffalo Jones' domestic buffalo herd in Kansas will soon furnish a new head to the market. Rocky mountain sheep are not very numerous and the handsome head of that animal brings from \$25 to \$30.
