Lariat Curve at Yankee Doodle Lake on the Denver, Northwestern and P acific (Moffat) Railway, Denver, Colo., May 20.—One of the greatest feats ever attempted in the history of the world's railroad building is being accomptished in constructing a railroad over the Rocky Mountains from Denver to Salt Lake. Heretofore there has been no direct line between these two cities. One railroad line out of Denver tuns to Cheyenne, Wyo, and thence westward to Ogden, deboueling to the southward to reach Salt Lake.

Mr. Rich was asked concerning the conference recently held by his Church, and stated that I was one of the larg-est and most enthusiastic conferences he had attended. "You can imagine somewhat of the immensity of the gath-ering," said Mr. Rich, "when I tell you that our Tabernacle was crowded almost to suffocation, and in addition to this the Assembly Hall, standing next to the Tabernacle, was also crowded in the same way, and then an open air meet-ing, with an attendance of about 2,000, and all three meetings being held at the same time. same time.

PRAISES HIS LEADER.

"Never since the days of the Prophet Joseph Smith, has any leader stood at the head of the Mormon Church with more of the love and confidence of the people, than has the present leader. This doesn't look very much like a disruption in the Church, does it? does it look as though the ex-senators of Utah with all their big and little aids, are meeting with much success in their efforts to break up the Mormon Church, does it? It is true that the at-titude of their papers, and the action of the ministers, who have formed what is known as "The Gentile Bureau of Information," are having some effect upon emigration in the state of Utah; but let me tell you something about this. They are the most inconsistent people on earth. With one breat; they cry out for the "Gentiles" to emigrate to Utah, and aid them in outnumber-ing the Mormons, and with the next breath they warn them to keep away from that priest-ridden country. If you would walk down the principal streets in Salt Lake City, you would find the ratio of non-Mormon and Mormon mer-chants to be about three to one in favor of the Gentile. If the non-Mormons are contented and happy in what is go-ing on, then the Mormons have no need to worry. Nothing that is being said or done by these crusaders is going to frighten the tens of thousands of Mor-mon converts from emigrating to Utah.
