COUNTY SCHOOL AFFAIRS.

Interesting Features of Last Week's Work in
Weber Stake Academy.County Teachers' Examinations Will
be Held June 20 to 22—Health
Transfers—Painful Accident.Superintendent W. B. Wilson of the
Weber county public schools was very
busy yesterday and today at the Weber
Academy holding examinations
for the eighth grade pupils. He is be-
ing assisted by the following principals
in the branches designated: Reading
and Domestic Science—Mr. Cragun, Mr.
Harris, U. S. History—Mr. Patterson,
Geography—Mr. Peeler, Drawing—
Mr. Langlois; Grammar and Spelling—
Mr. Alton, Mr. Allen, Mrs. Maw;
Arithmetic—Mr. Neal, Miss Ipsen.There are sixty-six pupils taking the
examination, the list of the graduates
will not be given out until Monday.

COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES.

Academy building. Very able
committees have been appointed to

in connection with the Decoration Day

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The board of education met last even-
ing and disposed of the following busi-
ness:The report of the finance committee
was received, showing a balance on
hand of \$1,944.91.The following applications for pos-
tions were received and filed. Two for
position of principal; two for teacher
of Latin, German and French in high
school; two for supervision of drawing
and one for position of superintendent.Since the last meeting of the board
four cases of scarlet fever and two
cases of measles have been reported.

WEBER STAKE ACADEMY NOTES.

Classes in botany and English under
Professors Lind and McKay respectively
have finished their text books and
are doing review work preparatory for
examinations.The class in astronomy under the
direction of the principal, Prof. L. F.
Moench, finished its textbook, and for
practical purposes met at the academy
last night to locate the leading con-
stellations, as well as principal stars.At eleven o'clock an adjournment
was had and the class adjourned to the
auditorium to view the great celestial
show offered to the eager class for
practical work. One by one the prin-
cipal constellations were pointed out,
and through an excellent glass, the
property of President Flugare, their
leading stars were noted and located to
the delight of the students. The night
was an ideal one and the practical les-
sons were much appreciated by all. The
class will meet again some evening
next week to further prosecute their
work.The academy this week was visited
by Hon. Joe Stanford, a member of
the academy board. Elder Stanford
spent most of his time in visiting the
newly erected buildings.An special invitation from Prof.
Terry, Elder John Davis addressed the
class in the Book of Mormon on the
subject, "Is the Book of Mormon a
Fiction?" The speaker presented strong
proofs from external evidences that
the book could not be a fiction. So
much were his remarks appreciated,
that an invitation was given to the
speaker to repeat the same lecture be-
fore the missionary class some day
next week.The committee on field day, through
its chairman, announced the terms for
Leaves, as being 60 cents for the
round trip, including entrance to the
grounds. The principal gave an invita-
tion to all students to join the excursion,
as well as all friends for the
occasion with the academy colle-
gians, as well as the Stars and Stripes.
Arrangements are being made for
four hundred to enjoy the outing.

as a dance in the pavilion will be pro-
