HE WILL NOT BE RECALLED.

Turkish Minister in Washington Fully Realizes that America is Aroused And He is Alarmed

L. Aug. 29.—Alarmed at condition of American citizens, Cheikh Bey, the envoy to the United States, has been ordered to leave Washington for Beirut. The minister left his summer residence for Washington, and his departure from the situation is his intention to ask Secy. Hay to go the customary formalities immediately. The departure will occur at Mr. Hay's tomorrow afternoon.

JIM CAUSED ANXIETY.

Each of the American warships is a source of anxiety to the minister. The government's only motive in this action was to protect its citizens, he fears it may have a negative effect and render difficult the efforts of the submarine force of the European powers. The minister pointed out that the revolutionaries in the Washington government's sympathy with their cause has aroused them to renewed attacks.

DOCTORS AND STUDENTS.

"You have asked for certain privileges for doctors and students. You want your physicians admitted on certificate to practice in Turkey. My government is very careful of the kind of doctors it licenses to practice. If your government would itself approve the diplomas of the American schools of medicine your physicians would be admitted without examination. This is the reason that the French and other European physicians are admitted on certificate."

"The medical schools in these countries are under the supervision, as it were, of the governments. In this country a man licensed to practice in one state would, in some cases, not be allowed to practice in another without examination. If some of your states disregard the quality of your medical schools it is surprising that my government insists on examining American physicians. And, why, if your physicians are so thoroughly educated, do they object to standing an examination when they come to Turkey to practice? It will require time to adjust this question, but you know the Turk is very tolerant, and I am sure my government will take a liberal view of the matter."

Washington, Aug. 30.—The bureau of navigation of the navy department has been advised by cable that the cruisers Brooklyn and San Francisco sailed from Genoa this (Sunday) morning, and are expected to arrive at Beirut Friday next.

Other than the advice from Admiral Cotton announcing his sailing, there were no developments in the Turkish situation today so far as Washington is concerned. No additional information came today from United States Minister Leishman, Secy. Hay saying tonight he had not heard from our minister to Turkey since yesterday morning.

The orders to Admiral Cotton to proceed to Beirut will not be canceled, it is authoritatively stated tonight, unless the president so directs. Such an order at this time, however, apparently would not avail anything, as the admiral is now on his way to Turkey.

The Associated Press interview with Cheikh Bey, the Turkish minister, at his summer home at Sayville, L. I., was a topic of almost universal interest in official circles today. That the minister's visit is so important is evident from the fact that the minister's presence in Turkey is fully realized here.

His uneasiness over the presence of an American fleet in Turkish waters, lest it be taken by the revolutionaries as an evidence of the American government's sympathy with their cause, it is thought, will not be a strong enough reason for its withdrawal. The administration regards it as a sacred duty to see that adequate and prompt protection should be given American interests in the disturbed district, and for this reason feels justified in having the warships sent to Turkey.

Contrary to expectation, Cheikh Bey had not advised in Washington on 10 o'clock tonight, and inquiry at the leading hotels failed to disclose that he had telegraphed he was coming. A number of dispatches were awaiting his arrival here. Presumably some of the dispatches are from the minister, Secy. Hay will grant the minister an audience tomorrow if he comes to the city.

With the departure of the cruisers Brooklyn and San Francisco for Beirut this morning, an announced by Admiral Cotton to the navy department, the entire European squadron is now on its way to the Turkish coast.

BOILER EXPLODES

And Big Compound Engine Is Blown to Pieces.

Baker City, Ore., Aug. 29.—One of the big compound engines of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company pulling through freight from the east into Weatherly, Oregon, was almost blown to pieces by the explosion of the boiler at 11 o'clock last night. Freeman Faust was killed instantly. Nicholas Gilmann was so badly mangled that it is almost impossible for him to live. Conductor J. E. Conner escaped serious injury. CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—Without a word of warning two men were killed and two others wounded by holdup men at the Chicago City Railway company's sixty-fifth and State streets, at an early hour today. The shooting was done by three men, who escaped after securing \$300.

Three of the men who were shot were working in the cashier's office and the other was a motorman, asleep in the outer office. The men in the office were shot before they were aware of the robbers' presence and the motorman was killed as he was rising from a bench, where he had been sleeping.

DEAD.

Frank Stewart, assistant clerk in cashier's office; shot through body; died half an hour later.

John W. Johnson, motorman; shot through head; died instantly.

INJURED.

William B. Edmond, receiving clerk; shot in left chest; will recover.

Henry Biehler, in the head; will recover.

The robbers took no chances, but disposed of all the opposition of the employees before they entered the office. Choosing the time when employees were busily engaged in balancing up the receipts of the night, just after the last conductor had turned in his money and left the barns, the robbers suddenly appeared at the receiving window and began shooting without warning.

The first bullet struck Stewart and he fell to the floor without a word. Biehler and Edmond, who were sitting near Stewart, turned to see what was the matter, but before they could leave their chairs they were rendered helpless by bullets of the robbers.

Johnson, the motorman, who had been asleep on a bench in the outer office, started up to go to the assistance of his companions, but was shot and killed before he could get to his feet.

Making sure that all opposition had been removed, the robbers then broke open the door of the cashier's office with a sledge hammer and took from the desk \$300 in bills. They then made their escape.

Four men were arrested three hours later on suspicion of being implicated in the crime. They are yet have not been identified.

WHAT HE WILL REQUEST.

Will he receive instructions from Constantinople Cheikh Bey will not request the Washington government to withdraw the squadron, but he will ask Secy. Hay's attention to the situation in Turkey, hoping that the state department might do something to remove the embarrassment of the port.

No word has been received by the minister of the attack on the American ship without official advice concerning the events in Turkey there, the minister hopes to find instructions calling him to Washington upon which will depend largely the scope of his conference with Secy. Hay. There is a possibility that the Washington government may be of service to the minister in solving his international difficulties and it is as well as the local troublemaker Beirut which is calling Cheikh Bey to Washington.

TALKS OF SITUATION.

When the Associated Press representative called at the modest little cottage at Sayville today, where the minister has established headquarters, the diplomat had just read in the morning papers of the mistake in Minister Leishman's message and was evidently greatly relieved. He talked freely of the present situation and did not conceal the fact that he thought the situation was serious.

Some of his remarks regarding Turkey's international complications he requested should be considered as confidential, but in the hope that he might be able to say something to the American people that would relieve the tension of public feeling here, he consented to the publication of a large part of the conversation.

PROFOUNDLY DISTRESSED.

"I am profoundly distressed," he said, "at the news at Beirut and believe that there must have been some mistake, because I had heard nothing about it from my government. The news today comes as a relief. American relations with I, hope, be received in the spirit in which it is said, for it has always been my endeavor, during the three years that I have represented the people of the United States in world affairs for the better relations of the two countries and I shall certainly not cease in my efforts in this direction at a critical time like this. But what can I say? It now appears that your vice consul was not assassinated."

"But does that lessen the gravity of the situation materially?" the minister was asked.

WHAT SULTAN HAS DONE.

"However that may be, you must admit that my government has done all that it could be expected to do. As soon as the local authorities learned of the affair they called at the American consulate and expressed their regret and promised to do all in their power to apprehend the persons guilty of the crime. In addition, the foreign office person has offered the strongest official assurances to the same effect."

APPRECIATES SITUATION.

"I appreciate fully the reasons for the dispatch of the American squadron. Rear Admiral Cotton is carrying his ships to protect the lives of American citizens, but have you considered that this may have the opposite effect and stimulate the revolutionaries to further outbreaks, thereby increasing the difficulties in the way of the port's recovery by foreigners? I must refuse at this time, however, to comment on this. I fervently hope immediate relief will be forthcoming."

"Have you any idea what motive inspired the attack on Mr. Magelssen?" he was asked.

ATTACK WAS PERSONAL.

"Despite the reports to the contrary," he replied, "and the efforts of the European powers to have it otherwise, I believe the attack was without political significance, and that the attack was made by a personal enemy of your vice consul. The unfortunate feature of it is that, coming at this time, the revolutionaries will attempt to profit by the occurrence, and it is this which renders the situation grave."

"Do you think your government realizes the seriousness of purpose with which the squadrons go to Beirut?"

"My government would not be very unwilling to believe that anything but the best relations exist between it and the United States. Of course the worst may come and relations be broken off, but I do not think so. I am hoping the other way. I can think of nothing more disastrous than a severance of diplomatic relations between the two countries. We will not speculate about that."

WASHINGTON PROGRAM.

"Has your excellency heard any rumor that the Washington government's program calls for the seizure of one or more ports in the event the sultan refuses the American demands, and that this in turn would be followed by the withdrawal of Minister Leishman and possibly your own departure from the United States?"

"No, I have not heard that. I hope it is not that bad. Of course, if your government desires it I shall go, but let us not take such a serious view of the situation. What demands do you refer to?"

BEIRUT AUTHORITIES ACTIVE.

Constantinople, Aug. 30.—Since the representative of the United States Minister Leishman regarding the attack on the life of Vice Consul Magelssen the authorities at Beirut are displaying a marked activity in their efforts to find the culprits.

It is understood that after an interview with Foreign Minister Tewfik Pasha, Minister Leishman requested Washington to recall the European squadron that had been ordered to Beirut.

It appears that the report by the Austrian consul at Uskuk that a detachment of troops discharged their rifles at the Austrian consulate there, arose from the simple circumstance that a party of Albanian residents, on leaving the station in a train, fired in the air, as is their custom on joining the colors, and the Austrian consulate happened to be close to the station.

The Bulgarian insurgents, on capturing the town of Neveska, Aug. 25, seized the communication of the garrison, levied a contribution of \$5000 on the town and then withdrew to the mountains. The Turkish troops, on their arrival, bombarded the town, but receiving no response they entered without molesting the inhabitants.

THREE PEOPLE DROWNED.

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 30.—At White Bear lake tonight, as the overturning of a boat, three people were drowned. They were attempting to knock off each other's hats.

WILL CALIF. STRIKE.

Miners' Union of Telluride Decides Upon this Plan.

Telluride, Colo., Aug. 29.—The Miners' union has decided to call a strike Sept. 1, in sympathy with the striking millmen of Durango. The millmen of Telluride will tomorrow make a demand for an eight-hour day without a reduction of wages in the case of the highest-priced class of workmen. Should this be refused a strike will be ordered at once.

A special from Durango says that because of the strike the work in the smelter, notwithstanding the strike of the union employees, the Citizens' alliance has expressed determination to keep the smelter running, and many business men, members of the alliance, have offered to show ore is necessary.

ADRIANOPLI IN ASHES.

People Panic-Stricken and Authorities Lose Control.

Sofia, Aug. 29.—The Obavnik publisher's report that one of the towns of Adrianople is in flames and that three other sections are burning. The inhabitants are panic-stricken and the authorities have lost control. The Turks are committing wholesale massacres.

A DOUBLE SUICIDE.

Two Men in San Francisco Shoot Themselves.

San Francisco, Calif., Aug. 30.—The bodies of two men, who had been suffering from a severe mental ailment, were found today in the morgue today. Christian Buehn, a laborer, committed suicide by placing the muzzle of a shotgun in his mouth, pulling the trigger with his big toe and blowing his head almost off. The other man, who had been identified, shot himself with pistol near the Ocean beach.

CLIMBING IN WYOMING.

Railroad Bridges Washed Out, Delaying Traffic.

Butte, Mont., Aug. 28.—A Miner special from Billings, Mont., says: "Word has been received here from Moorcroft, Wyo., that the most disastrous cloudburst in the history of that section occurred there yesterday."

Two large bridges on the Burlington railroad with a considerable amount of trackwork were washed out and stored, delaying traffic from 15 to 24 hours. Two passenger trains are stalled and it is not expected to get trains through until late tonight. Wire communication over the Burlington was interrupted until today.

Springer, N. M., Aug. 29.—Cornelia Gonzales, on attempting to enter the home of Mrs. Sarah D. Solano, who was at home with her two children, was killed by the woman with an axe. The woman struck him over the head six times breaking the skull in many places.

Gonzales was a brother-in-law of Mrs. Solano. A coroner's jury exonerated the woman.

FRANK BAKER CAPTURED.

Member of Notorious Curry Band Operating in Montana.

Have, Mont., Aug. 30.—Stock Inspector George W. Hall captured Frank Baker, one of the Curry gang, who had positive information that the hold-up westbound flyer at Malta this morning, and would have captured the other two members of the gang had not the sight of the numerous Pinkerton detectives flushed the gang. The company had positive information that the hold-up would occur near Wagner this morning, where the famous hold-up of two years ago occurred.

Hall spotted his three men at Malta and boarded the train. As the train the outlaws fled. One man boarded the blind baggage, another climbed on to the rear and a third man walked into the day coach and took a seat.

As the east and westbound trains met at Malta, the eastbound pulled in just as the westbound was preparing to pull out. Immediately a dozen detectives and special service men, armed with Winchester, jumped off the incoming train, and the men made for the express car and climbed in.

The robber on the rear coach saw them, swung off the rear coach, ran up to the front of the train, told his accomplices the game was off, and they both made their escape. Hall had in the meantime caught himself in one of the closets of the coach where the train robber was sitting, being fearful that he would recognize him.
