WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Callom

Hoar, Morrill, Sawyer, Sewell, Sher-

man and Spooner.

Before taking up the subject, Ingalls

offered a resolution calling upon the

Secretary of the Interior to prepare

a bill to the reclamation of private

lands in New Mexico and Arizona.

Adopted.

Sabin introduced a bill to amend

the act March 3rd, 1879, to provide

for the right of way through public

lands of the United States. Referred.

Sewell, from the committee on the

bill making an annual

appropriation to provide arms and

equipment for the militia, made a re-

port reducing the appropriation from

\$300,000 to \$400,000, which was agreed

to.
