San Francisco, 3.—Idaho advices to March 30th, say the bloody war between the Ida Elmore and Golden Chariot mining companies has ceased, the conflicting claims being compromised. The United States Marshal had arrived in Silver city, with a proclamation from Governor Ballard, commanding the belligerents to disperse, and notifying them that the whole force of the Territory would be called on to aid the authorities in suppressing the riot. Upon reading the proclamation, the parties signified their willingness to submit to the authority of the United States.

The Legislature of British Columbia to-day selected Victoria as the seat of government.

New York, 3.—The emigration to California is immense. The Pacific mail steamer of the 1st of April, was obliged to refuse over twelve hundred passengers.

Washington.—House.—Very few members were present and no business was done.

Senate.—The amendment to the seventh rule, offered by Drake yesterday, was taken up and adopted, after being slightly amended.

Several phonographic reporters, and other witnesses, were examined with regard to the President's speech at the White House, August 18th, 1866; also the speech at Cleveland, on September 4th of the same year.

Chicago.—Washington specials express the belief that the managers will have submitted all their testimony to-morrow.

Gen. Ord, wife and seven children, sailed on the steamer *Arizona*, for Aspinwall, on April 1st.

Chicago.—The examination of the witnesses in the impeachment case yesterday was protracted and tedious. The testimony was forced, and was entirely as to the correctness of the published reports of certain speeches made by the President.

London.—The Commons was densely crowded last night to hear the conclusion of the debate on Gladstone's motion to dis-establish the Irish Church. The question was on Stanley's motion to postpone the question to the next Parliament. The Prince and Princess of Wales, and several other members of the Royal family stayed in the Royal gallery until the debate closed. The vote was reached at half past two this morning. Six hundred members voted. The government was defeated by sixty majority. The announcement was greeted with wild cheers from the Liberals. On going into committee on Gladstone's resolutions they were carried by a majority of 56. In the committee, Gladstone moved his first resolution, and that the committee report progress. The House adjourned at half-past three.

Columbia, S. C.—The Democratic State Convention nominated W. D. Porter for Governor; a Representative for Congress and delegates to the National Democratic Convention were also nominated.

Chicago, 4.—The rebel Col. Glenfel has escaped from Dry Tortugas, where he was sentenced for life, for a conspiracy to burn the City of Chicago, and to rescue the rebel prisoners at Camp Douglas.
