Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.

Constructive Damages.

NEW BEDFORD, 11.—The merchants and ship owners, to-day, decided to prosecute in the court of the *Alabama* claims for constructive damages, on account of prospective catches of whales which were destroyed or frightened out of the Arctic Ocean by the *Shenandoah* in 1865.

Returning to Work.

VICKSBURG, 11.—Reports from the interior state that the negroes are returning to the fields. The city is quiet. Crosby and several of the negro leaders are still retained, partly for their own safety, but also for trial.

A Rebellious Speech.

WASHINGTON, 11.—At the re-instatement of the confederate dead, to-day, Dr. Garrett, of this city, and in-law of ex-governor Wise, of Virginia, delivered the address, not General Philip Cook, as was stated in the noon dispatches; it was strongly tinged with rebellion.

Wool.

PHILADELPHIA, 11.—Wool is dull and steady, stock unusually light for the season. Colorado, washed, 30 @ 35; do unwashed, 25 @ 28; extra merino pulled, 45 @ 47; No. 1 and super, pulled, 45 @ 47; Calat, fine and medium, 30 @ 35; do coarse, 25 @ 35.

A Reduction in Freight Rates.

INDIANAPOLIS, 11.—The western bureau of railroad commissioners met here to-day, and ordered a reduction of seven cents on the Winter schedule for fast freight; this is supposed to be the beginning of a war against the Baltimore and Ohio railroad for their refusal to join the Saratoga compact.

Libel Suit.

BALTIMORE, 11.—Judge Telford, of the circuit court, Baltimore County, has instituted a suit against the *Baltimore American* for libel, damages, \$50,000, for circulating the action of the court in certain cases.

FOREIGN.

Russia.

St. Petersburg, 11.—News has reached the advanced post of the Russian army in Central Asia, of the safe arrival in Khokan, of the first Russian trading caravan which ever penetrated to that country; the reports read from the caravan complain of the hostile agitations among the native tribes, caused by the intrigues and investigations of British agents.

Campaign Commenced.

The Russian campaign against the Turcomans in Khiva has commenced; two columns are in motion, one has already crossed the Amu river and is operating in Khiva territory.

FRANCE.

Lost 700 Men.

HENDAYE, 11.—General Lema is reported to have lost 700 men in his recent defeat.

PRUSSIA.

Armin's Trial.

BERLIN, 11.—The Count Von Armin was interrogated with reference to the authorship of certain newspaper articles, stating that he was about to resign the ambassadorship because of that country; he said he would call the Secretary of State to prove that the foreign office asked whether he wanted to see the article in the *Cologne Gazette*, and admitted that he wished to influence the press, he also acknowledged that the letter to Dr. Dollinger was his, but refused to answer questions in relation to the letter.

Armin's Trial.

Herr Von Bulow testified that Bismarck ordered Baron Holstein, subject to the approval of the Emperor, to treat the statement in the *Echo de Paris* ironically, and to reproduce it in German papers. Herr Landsberg, a journalist, was examined; he acknowledged that he sent the disclosure to the Vienna press, but declined to state whether or not he had written the letter included in the indictment concerning the purchase of the *Zeitung* or given any newspaper by Armin; the latter frequently spoke on that subject, but witness never considered his insinuations serious.

Herr Mulumba, member of parliament and editor of the Ultramontane journal *Germayna*, has been arrested and imprisoned for publishing seditious matter.

THE PIOUS HARLAN.—"The truly good Richard Smith" seems to be not the only pious man troubled with "wicked" thoughts. Brother Harlan, a Christian statesman and immediate proprietor of the daily *Chronicle*, has his associates, who speak of great scandal in the pious mind of said brother, by inserting, surreptitiously, vile paragraphs in that great journal of his. Watching their opportunity, when Brother Harlan retires to his closet to wrestle with the evil one in prayer, these associates, with hearts prone to evil and consciences sold to Satan, insert certain lascivious editorials in this great family journal. Brother H. is driven to denials, explaining a vile paragraph appeared in this excellent journal last week as an "Excelsior Garter." Brother H. assumed the curious view, that he was not the author of the paragraph, but he was in a back closet

on his godly knees, praying the Lord for more grace and a better income.

We feel sorry for this excellent man, for his predicament with his partners is peculiarly perplexing. He cannot dismiss them as he wishes, for that he cannot pay them arrangements for salary due, and all denials, protests and explanations are in vain.
