HOTELS SPRINGING UP.

This amount does not cov-er the value of contents which, if added, would run the sum up to \$500,000,000. In-surance carried amounted to about \$235,000,000, of which \$180,000,600 is paid. This represents 80 per cent of insurance carried against 50 per cent recorded for the Chicago fire and 30 per cent record-ed fo the Baltimore fire. MUCH BUILDING ON. In describing the building now un-der way throughout San Francisco Mr. Booth rites: "An immense amount of building is being done in all parts of the city. Two, three and four story buildings of a permanent nature are being erected. The northern part of the city which was almost entirely wiped out, has been entirely rebuilt and all the buildings are superior to those they displaced. The great cen-ters of trade in the city have changed materially and to a more or less pro-nounced extent. Fillmore street and Van Ness avenue are today as in-viting places for shoppers as any of the streets in any city in the country. The stores are all fitted up with splen-did fronts and present a handsome appearance. All the streets are well lighted and I think I can say safely, better lighted than most of the shop-ping streets in any of the eastern cittes.
