Organized for Winter.—At 7.30 last evening the Y. M. M. I. A. of the 17th Ward met and re-organized, when the following officers were unanimously elected: President, A. E. Hyde; First Counselor, D. F. Davis; Second Counselor, L. S. Tingey; Secretary, H. C. Wallace; Assistant Secretary, H. Jacobs; Treasurer, C. R. Howe.

Re-organization.—The re-organization of the Y. M. M. I. A. of the 13th Ward was effected last evening, and resulted in the election of John Reading as President of the Y. M. M. I. A., and of Miss Nellie Little as President of the Y. L. M. I. A. Instructive and interesting remarks were made by Mrs. Zina D. Young, Bishop Atwood and Bishop Samuel Atwood of Kamas.

"Muggins" Taylor Dead.—A communication from the town of Billings, Montana, states that "Muggins" Taylor, who was well known in this vicinity is dead. It appears that he was Deputy Sheriff of Billings, and while in the discharge of his duty, was shot by a rough named Lump, about the first of this month and died from the effects of the wound the following week.

Encourage Home Talent.—We observe that Brother Lorus Pratt has opened a place of business a few doors west of the Theatre. Those desirous of obtaining portraits in oil, water-colors, Indian ink or crayon can be accommodated by calling upon him.

The Hintze Case.—The Hintze case was called up before Commissioner McKay on Tuesday afternoon, but the prosecution was not ready, and it was adjourned till Friday. Mr. Hintze being released under \$500 bonds. He is charged with unlawful cohabitation, the woman being Mary Jensen whose brother swore out the complaint. The defendant maintains that there is nothing whatever behind the complaint but spite. He has not married the girl and there is no foundation for the charge in any way.

Grand Jury Released.—On Tuesday the grand jury, after bringing in six indictments under the territorial statutes and under the laws of the United States, were released until the 8th of November. The Judge ordered the release without any request from the jurors. The significance of this action when coupled with the fact that the District Attorney intends to take the stump in his own interest as candidate for Delegate to Congress, is recognized by the multitude, and the propriety, to say nothing of the good taste of that functionary in neglecting the duties for which he is paid, to engage in politics in his own behalf, is strongly questioned by the unsophisticated.

"Squeezed—Shot."—The Ogden Pilot gives the following particulars of a distressing accident and a singular shooting case that ought to be investigated:
"L. Smith, a switchman in the employ of the Utah and Northern Railway in this city, met with a very painful accident this forenoon, which may prove serious. He had just made a coupling and signaled to go ahead, when he undertook to jump upon a flat car by placing one hand on the car and the other on the depot platform. It being muddy, his foot slipped, and before he could recover himself, one of the wheels struck him and pressed him against the edge of the platform. The engineer heard him cry out and stopped the train as quickly as possible, but before he could reach him the unfortunate man was very badly bruised, but no bones were broken. He was taken to the hospital and received the attentions of Dr. Mitchell.
"A woman by the name of Mrs. Jones, traveling with a team and wagon, stopped at Kelo's ranch, about thirty-five miles from Ogden. Kelo claims that she either denied the bill or refused to pay him. After she left he got out papers and with an officer followed her to Bovine, a small station on the Central Pacific Railroad. An altercation ensued between her and the officer, which resulted in a shooting affray, in which she received a fatal charge of shot, from a double-barreled shotgun in her right breast. She was taken to Kelton and Dr. Carnahan, of this city, was telegraphed for and went up last evening to attend her. We learn this afternoon that she is still alive, with a fair prospect of recovery."

CITY COUNCIL.

Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, October 17th, 1882, Mayor Jennings presiding.

A petition was submitted signed by L. Grande Young and five others, land owners on Fruit street, between First East and Walnut streets, representing that the street surveyor had engaged in grading said street in front of the petitioners' lands. That the grade as established by the surveyor cuts the street in such a manner as to leave the lot of petitioners from ten to ten feet above the street, rendering the lot inaccessible by team. That said grade, as now established, was inconsistent with the wants of the petitioners and the great majority of the residents of that vicinity, and if pursued to completion in its present contemplated form, would work irreparable damage to the petitioners. They therefore asked that said grade be modified and made to conform more to the interests of all concerned and more particularly to those owning land immediately adjacent to the cut. Referred to the committee on streets and alleys.
George R. Jones petitioned to be allowed to purchase back from the city a certain tract of land contained in section 24, township 1 north, range 1 west, containing 29½ acres, fully described and shown upon accompanying plot. Petition received and prayer therefor not granted, it being the present policy to dispose of no land in that vicinity.
Application for license from Tomney & Miller for license to transact business as retail liquor dealers for three months from October 15th, 1882, at No. 91 First South Street, directed to the committee on licenses.
Application from Keyser & Moritz was submitted for license to manufacture malt liquors at the Salt Lake City Brewery for three months, from October 15th, 1882. Granted.
Albert Cameron petitioned for an auctioneer's license for one year from October 15th, 1882. Granted.
A communication from the city surveyor was presented, stating that in accordance with instructions from the Council he had prepared a profile of the grades of the street and sidewalks of South Temple Street from Fourth to Seventh West Streets; the profile accompanied the communication. After a studios examination of the surveyor's profile, on motion, the grade as therein designed and plotted were adopted by the Council and established as the grades of the street and sidewalks in that vicinity.
Councilor Ritter stated that some months ago he made a proposition as superintendent of the Utah and Nevada Railway, to supply a gravel train to be used in conveying gravel from the point of the mountain west to the street along which runs their track, providing the city would furnish laborers sufficient to load and unload the cars; and added that he was now ready to renew that proposition. On motion the proposition of Superintendent Ritter was accepted, and the Supervisor of Streets instructed to furnish the necessary labor.

Alkerman Raleigh petitioned in behalf of J. G. G. and all that he granted a lease for five years of certain parcel of land on the ridge lying east and north of Ensign Peak, said lease to be on such terms as Council might decide. Referred to the committee on public grounds.
The committee on construction of Jordan and Salt Lake City canal reported that \$4,681.55 had been expended on the various accounts connected with said canal during the month of September, and presented vouchers for the amounts paid for supplies furnished and labor performed, the total of which agreed with the amount reported. Approved and filed.
The committee on streets and alleys, to whom was referred the petition of Edward Brain and others for the grading of Pine Street reported that they had examined the same, and recommended that the surveyor establish the grade of said street in its order when he shall be instructed, commencing at East Temple Street. The report forth that the street in question (Pine) was at present tolerably even and at a moderate up-hill grade, on good soil, and that the committee were aware of many streets needing the attention of the superior much more than that one. Adopted.
The following bills were presented and allowed: W. W. Taylor, for copying assessment roll of City, eleven days, at \$5, \$55; Mrs. Kay, for ground rent, Fourth District Market lot, for quarter ending October 15th, \$23; cost expenses in case of dismissed poll tax, City vs. C. P. Huey, \$23.35.
An appropriation of \$133.35 was made to pay sixty days' interest upon a corporation note of date July 25th, to Desert National Bank for \$10,000; interest at eight per cent. per annum.
Adjourned for one week.

Fine Display.—Mr. Dwyer's window presented a pleasing spectacle last evening, in the exhibition of Prang's Christmas, birthday and wedding cards, just received from the east, and tastefully arranged by Mr. Harry World, with a number of beautiful plaques of the latest design. They are selling like hot cakes.

Pantomime.—Thursday evening the Humpty Dumpty pantomime Company open an engagement at the Theatre. They come highly endorsed. The performance was said to be funny in the extreme and to contain nothing in the least objectionable. The box office is open for the sale of tickets.

The Chicago Times says of this troupe:
Andrews and Stockwell's Ideal Pantomime and Star Specialty Company, achieved an unequivocal and thoroughly well deserved success at the Olympic Theatre last evening. They gave a deeply and continuously interesting performance vastly different from ordinary pantomime companies. From the very first act to the close of the programme the attention of the audience was entirely given to the stage performance.

Theatre Improvements.—Mr. George C. Tryon, the painter of the ship scene which recently attracted so much attention at the Theatre, is now engaged on two magnificent procenium wings. Two heavy white marble columns placed on each side of the procenium opening, surrounded and partly covered by rich crimson drapery, support a continuation of the same drapery, arched in Pompeian form, and with details consistently carried out in a similar style. Immediately behind the arched opening formed by the front drapery, hangs a simple lambrequin of white satin, with a gold medallion fastened to the centre of the principal festoon, in which is graven the bee hive of Utah; surrounding the medallion are thistles on one side and roses on the other. The prevailing colors of the arch border are rich crimson and gold, the heaviness lightened up with black. The corners of the arches are weighted down by medallions of gold, varied by reliefs in white marble. The whole combination includes richness contrasted by extreme delicacy, and care has been taken that each, while harmonizing with the other, shall be separated by graceful continuous masses. Masking the top of the leading drapery hangs close to the procenium another narrow maroon "border" with a medallion and drapery surrounding it, looped closely. The medallion in the centre is placed there as the response to those at the extreme ends of the drapery. This last border is hung in front of the drop curtain. The others about six feet back from the procenium opening.
