FRED KESLER'S PETITION REJECTED. In the matter of the petition of Fred Kesler, Jr., representing that he is a part of the judicial power of Salt Lake City, the City Attorney reported as follows:

That the city jail is located at the City Hall, that the marshal and police have their offices there and as a matter of public convenience there ought to be a Justice's Court estab-lished there for the trial of offenders against the ordinances of the city. To

allow persons to be taken indiscriminately to different justices of the peace in the city would involve the expense of an increased police force, and necesan increased police force, and neces-sarily would require as many Deputy City Attorneys to properly attend to the duties of these offices as there are justices of the peace in the city; as it might happen upon any given day or days that there might be offenders against the ordin Justice in the city. Therefore, for the orderly administration of justice and as a matter of public economy, in my opinion it is perfectly proper to desig-nate one Justice of the Peace to hold his office at the City Hall before whom shall be tried all violators of the ordinances of the city. I do not agree with Mr. Kesler in saying that the United States "Fee Bill" applies to the office of Justice of the Peace. It has no much application for office of Justice of the Peac has no such application, the reason that the fees the Justice of the Peace for fees of яге regulated by the Territorial statute. For the city to pay the regular fees stipulated in the "Fee Bill" for each offender tried for violation of the or-dinances would involve a sum of money more than twice the amount of salary paid Mr. Laney. For these and many more reasons I recommend that the petition of Mr. Kesler be rejected."

ARBITRATOR APPOINTED.

The committee on fire department recommended the appointment of T. C. Rooklidge as arbitrator in the matter of the claim of Haulon & Benson. Adopted.

follows: "We, your committee, to whom was referred the resolution of Councilman Anderson in relation to increasing the pay of the captains and sorgeants of police, would respectfully recommend: That the pay of the captain of police be increased \$15 per month, and that the pay of the three duty sergeants be in-creased \$10 per month, as the charter pre-vonts the salary of any appointed officer from being changed when the same has once been fixed by the Council. We also recommend and suggest that the city atonce been fixed by the Council.
