# SITUATION IS VERY GRAVE.

Milliant Catholics Are Rejoicing at Attitude Taken by His Holiness.

Paris, Dec. 9 .- France tonight seems to face an alarming religious crisis. Last night's reports of the pope's eleventh hour rejection of the government's final proffer under which Cathle worship could be continued under the common law turns out to be only too true, and the deadlock now is apparently complete. According to the holy father's orders, declarations under the law of 1881 are prohibited, but the parish priests must remain in their churches until driven out by vio-

The official confirmation of this relence. pert has created a sensation, both in government and Catholic circles. Cardinal Lecot, archbishop of Bordeaux; Archbishop Germain and others who already had advised compliance with the law, have hestily instructed the

formed, the parish priests must remain in their churches and continue to say mass until driven out by violence. If a schismatic priest appears, the legiti-mate priest must leave the church, first warning his parishioners; he must not participate in any schismatic service.
