REFUSES CROWN DOES KUCHLER

Modestly Turns Aside Suggestion That He Become a Prohibition Leader.

ENTRENCHED IN COMMITTEE

As Chairman of That Which Will Consider Leform Measure He Announces His Opposition to It.

When the present legislative assem bly first organized for work, and Rudolph Kuchler showed himself as chairman of the committee on manufactur ers and commerce, and it was announced that liquor legislation would go to this committee for settlement, it was declared that a plan to smother such legislation had been formed.

Kuchler's first answer was that he was loyal to his constituents and that in spite of cirticism he would go ahead

serving them as a faithful legislator. Kuchier in politics is one of a trio of men elected to office out of a group of intimate political friends. Another of this group, his colleague in the sen-ate, was openly and deliberately a hired agent of the National Brewers' association for the months during which the pre-election campaign was waged the pre-election campaign was wagen.

Kuchler had as an advantage a reputation for leadership in the house gained while Joseph of Salt Lake, Robinson of Bingham and Kuchler of Weberhandled that body at will. It was expected that he would repeat this skilled attainment of leadership in the ful attainment of leadership in the state senate. JUST AN INCIDENT.

During the days of Kuchler's candidacy for the state senate, while temperance legislation was a foremost cry in Ogden, a paper entitled "Industrial Utah," published at 2470 Washington avenue, carried strong temperance articles. One day the editor received from Fred J. Kiesel an invitation to "come and see him." This editor is B. F. Thomas. He did not go to see him, but Mr. Kiesel met him in the elevator of Mr. Kiesel met him in the elevator of the Eccles building, and Mr. Kiesel then took a page advertisement for the "Fred J. Klesel company, whisky merchants." The rest of the advertisement "Orders filled with accuracy and celerity from the best brands of Ken-tucky, free or bond, also in cases bottied under government supervision."
It made its appearance in the issue for Oct. 20, 1908. In this same paper, for this same issue of Oct. 30, there was inserted an article accompanied by a picture of Hon. Rudolph Kuchler, And it was an article prepared after careful consideration by the candidates and the county chairman. This article said: "The gentlemen on this ticket are well known to most of the people of the county. Those who have served in the legislature before have made records that were creditable to themselves and to their constituents. Upon the issues that touch the home and welfare of all the people industrial Utah is confident they will do the right thing. We beieve the temperance people have noth-ing to fear from the Republican legisla-ive delegation. And this was published at the very time that Kuchler's present colleague was disbursing literature from his law office, 407 First National Bank building, for the National Brew-ers' association. Yet the county chair-man and the candidates prepared the count for this article, and were count copy for this article, and were cogni-zant of the article's intent, published as a final appeal to voters before the elec-

Ruchler was yesterday visited by a delegation of citizens who were named at a mass meeting held in Ogden Wedneiday evening. Kuchler had been invited to this mass meeting but he had found that his loyalty to the "interests of the people" compelled him to attend an unimportant committee meeting in Salt Lake. Those who called upon him wers. D. O. McKay. C. C. Richerds. P. T. Wright, I. L. Clark, Hyrum Helnapp, and Rev. Guy W. McCreery. They presented to Senator Kuchler the petition signed by 6.400 citizens of Ogden, asking for prohibitory legislation.

Kuchler, who had excellent opportunity to study the saloon question as a part owner of the Columbia Clear sompany, then proceeded to expound the philosophy of the termperance reform. He expressed first his great pleasare at the honor bestowed upon him in the fact of the call made upon him, then he said he was more than pleased to have the people of Weber county call upon him to express their views. After that he went on to express his legislative record. He said: "When I was nominated for state senator from Weber county by acclamation, and elected to that position by a flattering majority, I feit that it was due to the fact that the people of Weber county had confidence in me and in my ability to represent them in the state senate.

During the campaign I promised some of my closest friends that in the event of my election to the senate that I would work and vote for the re-election of Reed Smoot to the United States senate.
