LOCAL BRIEFS.

Cahoon Convalescent.—L. Cahoon is convalescent from injuries received by a fall of 25 feet down an elevator shaft at Murray recently.

Charles Popper Dead.—Charles Popper, the well known former owner of Dapperston place northeast of the city, died Saturday evening, in New York at the age of 69. The funeral was held today. While resident here, Mr. Popper made a fortune in the meat and cattle business, removing subsequently east. He leaves three sons and two daughters, his wife having died five years ago.

Lost Put in Mail Box.—A bundle of letters and other papers, supposed to be the property of Dr. S. G. Eglihan, were found in a mail box at 100 Main Street, and turned over to Postmaster Thomas, along with two drafts of \$100 each, issued at Graysville, Ill., and payable to Harman Siegert at St. Louis, which were also found in a mail box. Pickpockets are supposed to have been at work in both cases.

Plaster Mill For Nephi.—Nephi is to have a \$30,000 plaster mill of 200 tons daily capacity, and a \$40,000 brick plant, for the erection of which a company has been incorporated with C. F. Hoffman at the head. Water rights at the mouth of Salt Creek canyon have been secured, valued at \$15,000, formerly controlled by the city, but allowed to laymen in municipal ownership. The new company has a capital stock of \$250,000.

Pharmacy is Robbed.—The Hospital Pharmacy at Seventh North and Second west streets was broken into by burglars sometime early Sunday morning, and robbed of nearly \$50. Securing a ladder from a near-by barn, the thieves had reached a rear window, which was pried open with a jimmy and the inside bars cut through. The cash register was rifled of \$8 and the stamp drawer of \$5. The two pay telephone boxes were taken by the robbers in the adjoining house, where they were broken open and their contents taken.

D. McNeal Leaves.—The many local patrons of the Postal Telegraph Cable company will make a final and permanent face in the departure of Manager D. McNeal who has resigned on account of continued ill health. He has proven a very efficient man, and the general management is sorry to lose him; but Mr. McNeal finds an entire change absolutely necessary, so he is to take an extended lay-off for fishing and hunting, and after convalescence expect to engage in engineering work. He is relieved by E. A. Morrison, recently manager for the company at Des Moines, Ia.

Funeral of Judge Bowditch.—The funeral of Judge John R. Bowditch was largely attended at the First Methodist church at 3 p. m. yesterday, where eulogies were delivered by Rev. Dr. W. M. Paden and Rev. F. B. Short. The pallbearers were W. B. Gray, L. M. Bailey, Judge Charles W. Morse, P. A. Dicks, Fred Eberhardt and E. McCarrick. The interment was in the family lot at Mt. Olivet cemetery. The casket was covered from view by a combination of flowers. E. E. Schrader, Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Peters and Miss Leona Schrader composed a quartet which sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere," accompanied by Miss Heckner. Mrs. Peters sang "Saved by Grace" and "Nearer My God to Thee," the last selection being sung at the grave.
