

A CHILD MURDER HORRIFIES NEW YORK

A Little Girl Mistrusted Before Death and Then Terribly Mutilated.

THIS THIRD CRIME OF SERIES.

A Cobbler Whose Shop Adjoins Victim's Home Placed Under Arrest on Suspicion.

New York, Aug. 1.—"The graveyard," as the foreign populated neighborhood on First avenue, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, is known locally, gave up today a fresh crime rivaling in atrocity the mysterious butcheries of last week. The latest discovered victim was an 8-year-old girl, and, like the two young women murdered, she had been shockingly mistrusted before death and the body mutilated when life was extinct.

The three murders are strikingly similar. Last Thursday night a woman was strangled in a Twenty-second street boarding house; the next morning the body of a still unidentified woman who had been choked to death, was found in an alleyway in East Ninth street. Katie Pritschler, daughter of a restaurant waiter, disappeared a week ago today and was killed that night. A ribbon placed about the throat and drawn so tight that it cut the flesh, showed how she died. Her body was found today. If the brutality of the murders can be qualified, that of the Pritschler

girl ranks first. She was assaulted, murdered and then her lifeless form was horribly mutilated. "The graveyard" takes its name from the proximity of the old Thirteenth street crematory, and the locality has been the scene of several revolting murders. The majority of the residents are foreigners. The body of Katie Pritschler was discovered today within a block of her home and scarcely 100 yards from the location of a piece placed by the father calling attention to the fact that his child was lost. How the body could have remained undiscovered for a week is not explained.

The body lay upon a berry crate with seemingly no effort at concealment.

"You can say for me," Coroner Harburger declared, "that the crimes in Berlin, of which the newspapers have told, have not been one-thousandth part as bad as the murder of this little girl."

At the coroner's direction, Gaetano Rippolano, whose cobbler shop adjoins the girl's home, was arrested and asked to explain his absence from his shop last Friday. He established the fact that he had spent the day at Belmont Court. The girl is said to have frequented Rippolano's place, and a search of the shop brought to light a man's shirt, which bore red stains. The cobbler was arrested and remanded to the coroner.

Giusseppe Bonfante, Rippolano's partner, was questioned, but threw little light on the case and was not

detained. The police also began a search for a woman who is said to have formerly roomed at the Pritschler home, but who left there after a quarrel and took lodgings in the house where the girl's body was found.

When the news of the finding of the little one's body spread through the neighborhood, excitement rose to such a pitch that the removal of the body and the arrest of Rippolano caused almost a riot. Many thousands of persons were in the nearby streets when the wagon from the morgue arrived. At sight of the covered body the crowd vented its grief and rage in a babel of tongues. The police were compelled to use force to get through the street. Soon afterward the arrest of the cobbler became known and the crowd charged the prisoner's shop. Rippolano had been safely removed to the station house, but his shop windows were smashed and only the determined front of the police reserves, who clubbed right and left, prevented greater damage.

John Kusmich, the Russian watchman under arrest as a suspicious person, and who is said to have been seen in the company of the girl whose body was found in the alleyway on East Ninth street, was today remanded without bail until Saturday. No clue to the murder in Twenty-second street was secured today.

Later it was decided to hold Bonfante for examination tomorrow. Dora Messner, who is said to have been seen in the company of the cobbler, was arrested as a witness. She was arraigned in the night court and held for the coroner.

ANTI-CLERICAL RIOTS

BREAK OUT IN ITALY.

Turin, Aug. 1.—The anti-clerical riots which have broken out in northwestern Italy are largely a result of popular excitement following the publication of certain alleged revolting and immoral practices of the Selesian fathers at Verazze. This exposure was printed in L'Avoro and in it pupils of the school maintained by the fathers described the rites performed daily, at which they called the "black masses," at which the priests and sisters were present and which the scholars say they were forced to attend. The school has been closed and the pupils sent to their homes. A crowd sacked the church at Verazze last night and stoned the convent of Salesians.

Rome, Aug. 1.—It is declared in Catholic circles that the revelations regarding immoral practices on the part of the Selesian fathers at Verazze are greatly exaggerated. They are an old growth, it is said, of stories that were circulated a year ago when a young priest named Bertane left the convent, the anti-clerical papers have based their entire case upon an isolated incident, and pupils of the schools have been incited to make false confessions.

BOYS START FOREST FIRE.

Hillingham, Wash., Aug. 1.—Boys burning a hornet's nest yesterday started a forest fire, which now menaces 125 residences in York addition in the eastern part of the city. Scores of men have been fighting the flames since last evening, but on account of lack of water have been unable to check the fire. Should the wind spring up from the east nothing would save that portion of the city. In that case hundreds of homes would be burned.

TRESTLE COLLAPSED.

Eight Men Carried Down, Four of Them Being Killed.

San Pedro, Cal., Aug. 1.—Four men lost their lives shortly after noon today when 400 feet of the trestle leading from the wharf of the Pacific Wharf & Storage company collapsed without a moment's warning. The dead men were crushed by carloads of rock or drowned in the harbor. Four others who went down with

them were rescued. All were Greek laborers who had been put to work this morning, and their names were not on the payroll. The trestle collapsed as a train of 12 flat cars laden with rock backed on the wharf.

THE CALIFORNIA IN COMMISSION

Vallejo, Cal., Aug. 1.—With appropriate ceremonies the new cruiser California, recently completed, was placed in commission shortly before noon today. Capt. Thomas S. Phelps, who will command the cruiser, made a brief speech and then read the orders to the crew assembled on the decks. This

was followed by the raising of the flag over the warship, which is the finest vessel that ever came to this yard. The California was built by the Union Iron Works, but was turned over to the government and completed at Mare Island, because of the strike of the iron workers at San Francisco. The new cruiser has a displacement of 13,800 tons and indicated horsepower of 25,000. She will join the Pacific squadron.
