It is owned and controlled by Mrs. Anna Baker; she is not accountable to any other person or institution, public or private, sectarian or non-sectarian. The institution is amply supplied with build-ings and grounds to accommodate ap-It is ings and grounds to accommodate ap-proximately 40 women and children. No appeal is made, so far as we know, to the citizens of Kansas City for funds

o support the work. "Mrs. Baker's career as a 'public "Mrs. Baker and the institution was closed.

Mrs. Baker and the institution was closed. "The Bakers then opened a children's home in Duluth, which they called 'Baker orphanage.' It was in connec-tion with this institution that Mrs. Baker inaugurated her present plan of employing women solicitors to travel over the country and raise funds. She employed as many as 12 solicitors at over the country and raise funds. She employed as many as 12 solicitors at one time to travel through Wisconsin and the surrounding states to support her institution, while as a matter of fact not more than three or four chil-dren were being cared for at the home, and the most of them were being paid for by friends or relatives.

WOMAN WAS ARRESTED.

WOMAN WAS ARRESTED. "In 1902 she was arrested at Hudson, Wis., on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. In April of that year Mrs. Baker represented to one Alexander Turner that the 'Baker Or-phanage' at Duluth was caring for a large number of orphans and that she was engaged in finding homes for them. Upon this representation Turner con-tributed a small sum. She was tried and convicted on the above charge. She was fined \$300, and ordered to be com-

was fined \$300, and ordered to be com-mitted to the county jail until it should be paid, not exceeding. five months. She secured her release by filing a bond and appeal to the supreme court. On Dec. 11, 1903, the supreme court re-versed the case and sent it back for a new trial on the grounds that the trial court had admitted evidence that was irrelevant to the issues in the case and very prejudicial to the defendant. BRANDED AS FRAUD, "Joseph's Home has always sheitered some women and children the number varying from three or four to probably 30. In many cases we know that they were paid for. Notwithstanding these facts the institution was branded as a fraud, except at the very begin-ning, by the local press, by many rep-resentative citizens and by many per-sons who were inmates or applicants for shelter at the home. "In a great many cases the citizens

"In a great many cases the citizens and authorities were obliged to furnish return transportation to women and children who had come to enter Joseph's Home and who had either been denied admittance or treated so badly after being admitted that they refused to remain. A case in point is that of Mrs. Viola Summers, from Mt. Vernon, III., which was published in the Joplin News Herald on Monday, Anz. 21, 1905. "Mrs. Baker employs solicitors to travel in the central states to secure funds for the ostensible purpose of supporting this institution. Judging from the loguiries that were received by Mr. C. Y. Lyon, mayor of Joplin, these solicitors have been working from Colorado to Pennsylvania. "It is impossible to ascertain the amount of funds collected by Mrs. Baker, or to know how they were expended. She has been requested to make a statement of her methods, funds collected, etc., to the Associated Charities of Kansas City, but she has falled to comply with the request. "We submit that, judging from the foregoing history of Mrs. Baker she is not a fit person to conduct an institution of the sort that she appeals to the addition, her method of collecting money Is unscientific, extravagant and sufficient in the support of the public."
