

MERIWETHER WILL TESTIFY.

Midshipman Will go on Witness
Stand in His Own Be-
half.

DETAILS OF THE FIGHT GIVEN.

Timekeeper and Referee and Others
Give Them—Case Will be Con-
cluded by Friday.

Amphipolis, Nov. 27.—No great progress was made today in the trial by court-martial of Midshipman Meriwether on charges that embrace one of manslaughter in connection with the death of Midshipman James R. Branch, Jr., after a fight between him and Midshipman Meriwether. Perhaps the most important developments of the day were the decision of counsel to put Midshipman Meriwether on the stand in his own defense, and the appearance of Dr. L. W. Glazebrook of Washington, who was present at the autopsy held on the body of Branch yesterday, in the role of adviser to Meriwether's counsel. Most of the testimony offered today was by witnesses and men and women who saw details of the fight and events that led thereto. Counsel for the defense offered Midshipman W. W. Bradley, of the second class to testify. Bradley said that he had been detailed for duty with Branch shortly before the fight. Branch had told him that they must try to get a report against "that man Meriwether."

When on duty Branch had told him to go against Meriwether, which he (Bradley) did not think was justified and which he refused to make.

Midshipman Leigh Noyes, who was the timekeeper in the fight, testified that Branch and Meriwether had fallen together in clinches three times. Branch had fallen in three other instances and two of the falls had been made by Meriwether.

He said Branch had not received much punishment up to the seventeenth round, when Meriwether offered to stop.

During the afternoon session Midshipman A. W. Fitch and L. R. Noyes, respectively referee and timekeeper of the fight, were recalled and again went over their testimony as to certain incidents of the fight. They said that it was thought Branch had hit his head against the floor.

Lieut.-Commander Decker testified that the floor in Bancroft hall, where the fight was held, had a concrete base, then a layer of rough boards and then the smooth surface boards.

Midshipman Ralph Yeager, who was Meriwether's second, said the latter had allowed in the fifteenth round, spraining his ankle, and that he was almost disabled thereby, but said he could continue the fight, though he could do little to defend himself.

The defense will close tomorrow unless the medical testimony relating to the autopsy consumes more time than is now expected.

The case will meet on Thursday (Thanksgiving day), unless an order to the contrary is received from the court.

PHILIPPINE INDEPENDENCE.

President of Anti Imperialist League
Says It is Assured.

Boston, Nov. 27.—The annual meeting of the Anti-Imperialist league was held in this city today. President Moorfield Storey, in his annual address, said: "Government by might the world over totters to its fall."

Dr. Storey referred to the war in the far east, saying that by it "the superstition that yellow men are inferior to white received its deathblow."

Continuing, he said: "There are those who would have us think that the cause of Philippines independence is lost. We do not believe it. We have not lost our faith in our countrymen. The independence of the Philippines is assured."

President Storey cited reports, both press and governmental, to prove that tranquility has not been established, to show alleged defects, civic, legal and administrative, and alleged deplorable trade conditions, and added:

"In a word, we have been trying to turn Philippines into Yankee, palm-trees into planes, by force. It is hopelessly foolish."

In his annual report Secy. Winslow said: "The principal work of the league during the latter half of the year has been the circulation through the press of the trustworthy Philippines press."

These officers were elected: President, Moorfield Storey; treasurer, David Greener; Jaskins, Jr.; secretary, Ervin Winslow.

AMBASSADORS HURRYING BACK.

Speeding to St. Petersburg Be-
cause of Critical Nature of
Situation.

THEY RECEIVED INTIMATION.

Said to Have Come from Russian Gov-
ernment—Workmen Congratu-
late Mutineers.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 27, 5:10 p. m.—On account of the critical nature of the situation, all the foreign ambassadors who were absent on vacations are hastily returning. M. Rompara, the French ambassador arrived today, and the Spanish and Italian ambassadors are on their way here. Herr Von Schoen, the German ambassador, will arrive Dec. 10, and the Austro-Hungarian ambassador is cutting short his leave of absence and will return immediately. American Ambassador Meyer, who is now in England, is expected to arrive soon.

It is understood that the Russian government has given an intimation to the foreign powers of the advisability of the presence of their ambassadors here during the present crisis.

The Bourse Gazette today published a dispatch from Sebastopol saying that discord has already broken out among the mutineers and confirming the report that the Brest regiment, under Col. Dutchevsky, had returned to duty, but a company of sappers remained with the mutineers. The Austrians, however, are neutral. Their disposition, however, is causing alarm among the officers.

The Bourse Gazette dispatch also reports that the Black Sea fleet, with the exception of the Panteleimon and the cruiser Oshakov, remained loyal, and that the mutiny on board the latter vessel is practically suppressed.

The Workmen's council has telegraphed congratulations to the mutineers at Sebastopol and follows: "The council in the name of the St. Petersburg proletariat, sends warm greetings to the soldiers and sailors of Sebastopol who have decided, following the noble example of the sailors of the Kriaz Potemkin, to fight for freedom in fraternal union with the workingmen. May the events at Sebastopol be an example to the soldiers of all Russia as the strike of the St. Petersburg proletariat in defense of the Cronstadt sailors was an example for the workingmen of all Russia. Then a union of the revolutionary proletariat and the revolutionary army will put an end to all remnants of the autocracy and rule of the ruins a free, democratic state."

Mutineers still Masters.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 28, 3:10 a. m.—Though the mutineers at Sebastopol are still master of the situation at Admiralty Point and though armed parties have apparently free access to the town, notwithstanding the announcement by the authorities that the roads leading to it were blockaded, dispatches received yesterday from Vice-Admiral Choukine, commanding the Black Sea fleet, present the situation in an optimistic light.

These dispatches which were read at an extraordinary council of the admiralty declare that most of the mutineers have decided to surrender, with their arms, though such action involves trial for mutiny before a court-martial.

This is confirmed in part by a dispatch to the Novoye Vremya, which says the spirit of the mutineers is falling and that several bodies have already surrendered.

On the other hand dispatches to the Associated Press from Sebastopol say that revolutionary orators succeeded yesterday in winning over a battalion of reservists and that, in spite of the arrival of reinforcements to the number of several hundred, the authorities did not dare to interfere with a review held by the mutineers before the cathedral of St. Vladimir, which is in the heart of the town.

So far as is known, most of the demands of the mutineers have to do with service conditions, including the release of reservists who have served their time, increase of pay, increase in the allowance of food and the removal of alleged incompetent and brutal officers.

Beyond a determination to proclaim martial law, nothing of a definite nature has transpired regarding the decisions arrived at by the admiralty council, but it is reported that the council agreed to the justice of many of the demands made by the mutineers and would recommend to the emperor that immediate steps be taken to ameliorate the conditions of the sailors.

The latest dispatch from Sebastopol says that the mutineers forced the officers and crew of the cruiser Oshakov to leave the ship. The crews of the battleships, Rodoslav and Vira, so far as is at present known, have remained loyal. One reserve battalion, however, has joined the mutineers. Several companies of the Vilna regiment have arrived at Sebastopol from Theodosia.

Martial law has been declared in the fortress.

MISTRUSTS ARTILLERYMEN.

Odessa, Nov. 27.—Gov.-Gen. Kaibars has received the following dispatch from Vice-Admiral Choukine, commanding the Black Sea fleet:

"The mutineers left the Kriaz Potemkin today and the vessel is now in my hands. The sailors together with the soldiers of the Brest regiment, who mutinied, have shut themselves in the Lazareff barracks, with some guns. When fresh troops arrive I shall attack, though I fear the artillerymen may join the mutineers. A very serious state of affairs prevails today. Several officers have been killed."

PEASANTS PILLAGE ESTATES.

Odoyan, Russia, Nov. 27.—The peasants continue to burn and pillage estates. The property of the noble, but the zemstvo of Kursk province, was destroyed last night.

PENSION AGENT AT TOPEKA.

Washington, Nov. 27.—Col. Wilder S. Metcalf, who succeeded Gen. Frederick Funston as colonel of the Twentieth Kansas regiment in the Philippines today, was re-appointed to the office of United States pension agent at Topeka.

MEXICAN TRUST MEASURE.

Mexico City, Nov. 27.—A bill has been sent to congress providing for alterations in the laws to permit the creation of trust companies on the American plan.

SMALLPOX SCARE AT TETON.

Great Falls, Mont., Nov. 27.—The people of Teton county are in a furry over what is believed to be a threatened epidemic of smallpox, as the result of the burglarizing of the pest-house. Several smallpox patients were confined in the confinement hospital and the place has never been fumigated to

MARSHALL FIELD, JR. DEAD.

Died from Pistol Wound Accidentally
Inflicted by Himself.

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Marshall Field, Jr., died at 5 o'clock tonight at the Mercy hospital.

Mr. Field, who was the only son of Marshall Field the multi-millionaire of this city, was accidentally shot on the afternoon of Wednesday, Nov. 22. He was examining a new revolver he had purchased when it was discharged. The bullet striking him in the right side, perforating the liver and spleen and injuring the spinal cord.

He was hurried to Mercy hospital, where an operation was performed and the bullet removed. The physicians from the first entertained but slight hopes of ultimate recovery, although the patient for two days seemed to hold his own.

At 8 o'clock this morning a decided change for the worse took place and Mr. Field rapidly grew weaker until his death.

When Coroner Peter Hoffman was notified of Mr. Field's death he immediately began preparations for holding an inquest on the body. A jury was empaneled at the Mercy hospital, where Mr. Field died, and was sworn by the coroner, who then continued the hearing until next Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

that Erickson is here in a poor mental
condition. This probably clears up the
mystery.
