CON. MERCUR ADDS TO FINE RECORD.

Trading Heavy and Prices Firm Under Large Selling Orders.

Distribution Today the Seventh of \$30,000 This Year.

Ajax, May Day and Lower Mammoth Traded and Were Stronger—Con. Mercur Further Tobogganed.

Great Mercur Company is Paying Over 18.6 Per Cent on Present Market Valuation.

Business on the mining exchange this morning was large and of an interesting character. Not many issues were active and traders confined themselves to the medium priced issues.

The great Consolidated Mercur Gold Mines company is today distributing its seventh consecutive monthly dividend in the sum of \$39,999 and no fewer than 1,300 shareholders are participating at the rate of three cents per share.

California was again the feature of the regular call. No fewer than 22,500 shares were dealt in and the price of the stock was advanced from 25 1/2 to 29 3/4, the closing bid being 28 3/4.
