LOCAL BRIEFS.

Coast strawberry growers have been notified by Salt Lake wholesalers that no more fresh berries will be received.

President Kingsbury has issued invitations for the annual faculty banquet, which occurs in the museum building Friday evening.

Orders are being prepared from National Guard headquarters regarding the summer season of target practice, which will be held Saturdays and Sundays.

Contractor Moran is laying 200 feet of concrete a day on east South Temple street; and the railroad people are making road bed and laying track ahead of him.

Some unknown canine fancier has carried off the dog "Billy" belonging to Seey, Cox of the Y. M. C. A., and the secretary is disconsolate. The police are in hot pursuit.

Willard Wells was delayed in getting off for California so that he was unable to leave until last evening. He is in excellent spirits over the prospects in connection with his trip.

W. D. McLean of the Colorado Fuel & Iron company has bought a 10 room modern house and 2 1/2 rods on Second street near Q, for \$2,500. A. B. Green has bought for \$1,500 the seven-room modern house at 8 1/2 Q street.

One of the most interested listeners at the Goldmark lectures was Treasurer A. W. Carlson of Z. C. M. I. and Mrs. Carlson. The Norse mythology tales which are the basis of the Wagnerian drama, have been familiar to Mr. Carlson since boyhood.

State Supt. of Schools Nelson has returned from Richfield, where he met with the school officials of Sevier county, and talked over the matter of establishing a high school at Monroe. He reports the indications for the establishment of the school as being fair.

The Sixth ward Sunday school workers, 25 strong, attended Sunday convention in a body, making the trip in the drug "Utah." They also lunched together, ate most of the grade school, a feature which did much to promote sociability among officers and teachers.

The new First National bank of Las Vegas has started on a career of prosperity, and plans are in preparation for a new and permanent building, with complete and thoroughly modern fixtures. The most extensive of the enterprise are confident Las Vegas will become a good commercial center.

A meeting of the state board of education will be held in Rupt. Nelson's office this afternoon to make final arrangements for the country teachers' examinations next month, and also to allot space for the different schools for the exhibit at the Lewis & Clark centennial.

The work of arranging the exhibit of the city schools for the Lewis & Clark exposition will be completed in the next day or two, and the display will be placed on exhibition in the grade room at the city and county building on Wednesday and Thursday for the inspection of teachers and patrons of the schools.

The Men's club of the First Baptist church will hold its regular meeting this evening at 8 o'clock. A short business session will be held, after which Mr. R. D. Burnett, physical director, will address the club on "The Basis of Physical Training of the Young Men's Christian Association." Light refreshments will be served.

The preparatory and first three years of the Normal school, who are not allowed to enter the University student body, have met and are taking preliminary steps for the formation of an auxiliary student body at the University. Thursday the committees in charge of the preparation of a constitution will report, when the organization will be completed.

At the meeting held last evening by the Veteran Volunteer Firemen of this city, they decided by unanimous vote to turn out in uniform and participate in the Deseret day parade in response to pressing invitations from the G. Flower shows are having the vogue, so far as pretty decorations go this week, and reports of families who have missed valuable flowers during the nights are becoming frequent. The house owners who have tried to make their grounds beautiful are naturally somewhat discouraged when their work goes for naught, and for this reason the complaint is becoming serious enough to make it go hand with flower shows, should they be caught.

Dr. Anita Newcomb McGee gave an interesting lecture last night on "A Woman's Experience in the Japanese Army." The lecture was in charge of the Red Cross work in Japan, with a corps of nurses under her. She paid a strong tribute to the Japanese hospital system and the endurance and courage of the native nurses, and exhibited a number of medals and decorations given her by the officials. Dr. McGee's lecture concludes the course given the past season under the auspices of the Y. M. M. I. A. lecture bureau. She lectures tomorrow evening at Dillon, Mont., on the same subject.

The non-commissioned officers of the local National Guard commands met at the Armory last night, and appointed a committee to draw up a constitution and by-laws in organization of a Non-Commissioned Officers' Association. TABERNACLE CONCERT. That in Aid of the "Gym" Will be Given Saturday Night.
