Under these rules the umpire is the sole judge of all plays during the game, and is entirely re-sponsible for the conduct of the players during such game, with power of sus-nersion for violation of any rules. No pension for violation of any rules. No one else is given authority, except managers, to punish players.

WALKER HAS NO AUTHORITY. "When the different parks were leased

for baseball purposes, there was no reservation or authority vested in the park manager, by which he might sit in judgment upon the conduct of any of the umpires or players who might participate in games upon the grounds; and if this league would now permit you or any other manager to assume the power which you now attempt to assume, it must ultimataely result in your not only passing judgment upon the players and umpires, but it would also permit you to sit in judgment upon the conduct of myself and the other officials of the league as well as the stocsholders and backers of the dif-
