He resided for a short time in Salt Lake City, then moved to Kaysville, Davis County, and afterwards to Farmington, where he has resided about twenty-five years. Brother Bourne was a man of irreproachable character, so much so that it has been said of him by those who have known him for a great many years, that they never knew him to do or say a mean thing. He was quiet, unassuming in his deportment, never taking a front seat to be seen of men, but always ready and willing to comply with any request that was made upon him by those presiding over him. The funeral services took place at the Farmington meeting-house. Bishop Secrist, presiding. Comforting and consoling remarks were made to the family, and the speakers all bore a loving and affectionate testimony to his worth as a man and a Latter-day Saint. The cortege to the cemetery consisted of twenty-eight vehicles. He leaves a wife, three sons and three daughters to mourn his loss. He was a kind husband, a good father, and a true friend. -COM.
