Council, through its proper committees, before making any appropriations to meet the same and before permitting the work to proceed, make inquiry regard-ing such objects. Of course, in practice, many emergencies will arise in which immediate action will be required; such as the breaking in of bridgee, bursting of water pipes, etc., provis-ions should be made excepting such cases from the operation of the plan here-inbefore recommended. Without the adoption of such a plan it will be almost cases from the operation of the plat here-inbefore recommended. Without the adoption of such a plan it will be almost impossible to keep the expenditures within the desired and necessary limit.
