

Council, through its proper committees, before making any appropriations to meet the same and before permitting the work to proceed, make inquiry regarding such objects. Of course, in practice, many emergencies will arise in which immediate action will be required; such as the breaking in of bridges, bursting of water pipes, etc., provisions should be made excepting such cases from the operation of the plan hereinafore recommended. Without the adoption of such a plan it will be almost impossible to keep the expenditures within the desired and necessary limit.

I have in no case granted a pardon except on the recommendation of the police justice and the assistant city attorney. In most cases the chief of police joined in the recommendations.

IT IS ACTING MAYOR BEARDSLEY.

The Mayor apprised the council by communication of his departure for Washington yesterday morning, and recommended that some member of the council be designated Mayor pro tem, to serve until his return.

Beardsley was appointed to that responsible position.

BEARDSLEY SPEAKS.

Beardsley in a neat and appropriate speech thanked the members for the honor conferred. He said he would try and do his duty and do it well. He trusted that Mayor Baskin would have a safe journey to Washington and return; that the councilmen would have a pleasant trip to the Pacific coast. He was satisfied that it would be a profitable one to themselves and to the city, and bespoke them a hearty and warm welcome when they should return.

HIS NAME IS DENNIS.

The Mayor sent in a communication in which he appointed Dennis C. Eichnor as police clerk in place of Absconder Glenn. The appointment was confirmed.

VETOED APPROPRIATION LIST.

The Mayor set back Tuesday night's appropriation list, vetoed for the reason that it contained an item for \$1000 for a trip by a Council committee to the Pacific Coast. His reason, he said was that the expenditure of public monies for junkets was wrong on general principles.

The list was passed notwithstanding the Mayor's veto on the following vote:

Ayes—Beardsley, Evans, Folland, Reiss, Horn, Kelly, Lawson, Rich, Simonds, Wantland—10.

Noes—Bell, Hardy, Loofbourow—3.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION AND REVIEW.

The city recorder recommended the appointment of a board of equalization and review on paving and curbing on West Temple street. The chair appointed as such committee: Kelly, Lawson, Folland, Horn and Simonds.

ANNEXATION PLATS.

The city engineer, on his own recommendation, was authorized to make plats of the district recently annexed to the city.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

City engineer asked leave of absence to accompany the council committee to California. Granted.

WILL NOT BE FILLED.

The committee on Jordan canal and irrigation reported adversely on the proposition to fill up the Ninth South street canal. Adopted.

THE CURFEW LAW.

The committee on police reported recommending that the request for the enactment of a curfew law be referred to the city attorney with instructions to draw up an ordinance covering the same. Adopted.

APPOINTMENT CONFIRMED.

On recommendation of the committee on police the appointment of Joseph Leavitt to a position on the police force was confirmed.

CROSS WALKS.

The committee on streets reported favorably on the petition of George Stringfellow for stone cross walks on State street between and including Fourth and Seventh South streets. Adopted.

CANYON DRIVEWAY.

The committee on streets reported favorably on the petition of John E. Dooly and others for the construction of a driveway from Capitol Hill to City Creek canyon. Committee on public grounds.

THE LOOFBOUROW TESTIMONY.

The Loofbourow investigation testimony was submitted by Beardsley and ordered attached to the report of exoneraton and filed in the office of the recorder.
