IRRIGATION MATTERS.

The Committee on Irrigation submitted the following report:

To The Hon. Mayor and Members of the City Council:

Your Committee on Irrigation to whom was referred the communication of Street Supervisor Paul, in regard to carrying out the orders of the City Council to fill up the canal on Seventh West street, and other streets in that portion of the city, respectfully state that the handling of these canals is, in our opinion, no longer a question of irrigation, but that it is a question of drainage, and we therefore recommend that this whole matter be turned over to the City Engineer with instructions to examine that part of the city with a vlew to finding proper drainage for surplus water and to the filling up of such canals as become useless or a nuisance in that part of the city, with regifest that he recommend, as soon as possible, such action as he thinks will best afford relief to that section. Adopted.

The committee on irrigation also recommended the adoption of the report of Watermaster Harvy for term ending December 31. Filed.

The same committee reported adversely on the petition of Isaac Hunter, who asked permission to dam City creek in order to cut ice. Adopted.

THE PEACOOK LIQUOR LICENSE.

In regard to the petition of A. J. Pea-cock for a renewal of his liquor license, the committee on license reported that the petitioner had beeu doing business at his present place since March, 1890. He had tendered the amount of the license to the treasurer and had filed his boud. The committee was of the opinion that the Council had no authority to discriminate arbitrarily as be-tween individuals applying for license, there being no ordinance to justify such actiou. The proper course of , rocedure would be to enact an ordinance providing that after a certain time licenses would no longer be granted to carry on this business in certain local-The committee recommended ities. that the Council reconsider its action and grant the petition. Action was deferred for one week.

J. H. Mellon represented that Ninth West Street, between Second and Third North, was flooded with water, which rendered it impassible. He asked permission to cut ice from the street, agreeing to make a roadway for teams. Committee on streets.

FIRE IN HOOPER ELDREDGE BLOCK.

Tuesday, January 13th at 3 o'clock destructive fire started in the basement of the store occupied hy Barton & Company, in the north half of the Hooper & Eldredge Block on East Temple Street, between South Temple and First South streets. The basement in which the fire originated was rented by Barton & Company to Hyde & by Barton & Company to Hyde & Griffin, who had sub-rented a portion of it to the Co-op Furniture Company, and in it the last named firm bad stored a considerable quantity of fur-niture. It was in this part of the basement that the fire originated by the explosion of a kerosene lantern which had been taken there by a boy in the employ of the Co-op. Furniture Company. Company.

The fire alarm was immediately sounded, and was followed by a quick response from the fire brigade, which arrived on the ground at an early stage of the fire, But for some reason, which remains unexplained up to the present, much valuable time was lost iu placing the apparatus of the fire department in position, and by the time that water from the various lines of hose was turned into the basement of the now fast burning building, dense clouds of smoke and sheets of flame
