

## GREAT GROWTH IN SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Grand Total of Membership Now Reaches 142,283, an Increase of 1,547.

### INTERESTING STATISTICS.

Figures and Facts That Tell of Expansion, System and Results in Work.

By far the largest auxiliary meeting of the general conference was that of the Sunday School union, which convened in the tabernacle at 7 o'clock last evening. All the gates were closed by 7:30, and at that time the building was crowded to almost its capacity, while outside were thousands clamoring and even begging for admittance. There were probably enough people shut out to have again filled the great structure.

The congregation that sat in the well lighted auditorium presented an imposing appearance, and when all arose to sing the Sunday school songs the effect was most inspiring. Seated upon the stands were General Superintendent Joseph F. Smith, Second Assistant David O. McKay and many members of the general board. President Smith presided, while Elder McKay conducted the exercises.

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT.

General Secretary George D. Pyper called the roll of stakes and missions, read the list of Sunday school officers, who were unanimously sustained, and submitted a statistical report for the year 1906. The following items are taken from the report:

The totals show a majority of female pupils of 4,209, but the reports indicate that in a few cases the boys predominate and in the more populous and congested districts the girls are largely in the majority.

In addition to the ward officers and teachers, there are 500 stake workers and 5,122 enrolled in parents' classes, making a grand total of members engaged in the Sunday schools, of 142,283, an increase of 1,547.

The average per cent of attendance during 1906 was as follows:

Number of Latter-day Saint children in the organized stakes over eight years of age not baptized, 2,412.

According to the report, 84 per cent of the officers and teachers, and 83 per cent of the pupils, keep the Word of Wisdom; and 33 per cent of the officers and teachers are tithing payers.

Number of volumes in Sunday school libraries, 28,387.

Following the reading of the report, the song "Shine On" was sung by the children of the Salt Lake stake.

#### SCHOOL WORK AND WORKERS.

Asst. Supt. David O. McKay stated in detail the results of the Sunday school convention, held on Thursday of last week. He spoke at length upon the duties of persons engaged in this great work, as superintendents, boards, officers and teachers. Council meetings should be held weekly, or just as often as possible, he said, and it would be found that there was plenty of

work to be done at each gathering. If the spirit of the laborer is kindled into the spirit of the laborer, the work will be done. He advised members of boards against interfering with local organizations, or subjecting officers or teachers to humiliation. Neither should board members be ignored when they visit a school. Courtesy is due from both sides, and should be extended.

Complete preparation on the part of teachers was urged by Elder McKay, who deprecated the custom too often indulged in of an instructor standing before a class with his or her eyes for the most part fixed upon the text, instead of entering heart and soul into the presentation of a subject that has been thoroughly mastered. The co-operation of parents in the Sunday school work, especially in the line of attending parents' classes was strongly dwelt upon by the speaker.

#### PRESIDENT SMITH.

President Joseph F. Smith briefly but strongly commented upon the item in the report which stated that 2,412 Mormon children over 8 years of age had not been baptized. He read from the Doctrine and Covenants the word of the Lord regarding the subject, and he said that no matter how many times men and women had been baptized for their own flesh and blood who had neglected the kingdom of God, he would not enter the kingdom of God with them. Elder Alvin A. Beesley led the congregational singing, and the children of the Salt Lake stake, who rendered two choruses, were under the leadership of Samuel D. Winter. The first song was, "Hark! listen to the trumpeters," by the assembly, after which Elder John Henry Smith offered the opening prayer. "Nay, speak no ill," was next sung by the congregation.

#### OUTDOOR SERVICE.

Overflow Meeting Held in Afternoon From Bureau of Information Steps.

Outdoor overflow services were conducted from the steps of the bureau of information building, Elder George A. Smith presiding. Thousands of people who could not get into the tabernacle or assembly hall gathered to hear the exercises from the outdoor pulpit. The service was held in the afternoon, and the speaker, in his characteristic spirited manner, "Services were commenced by singing 'We thank Thee, O God, for a prophet.' And prayer was offered by Elder Sheldahl. The congregation sang 'O My Father.'"

#### ELDER WM. T. JACK.

Elder George Albert Smith introduced William T. Jack of the Cassia, Idaho, stake. Elder Jack was much pleased with the conference and the excellent spirit which prevailed. From the crowd of people overflowing the space, unable to gain admittance to the meetings in the buildings, it is evident that Zion is growing. He rejoiced in the possession of a testimony of the truth of the gospel which he had received through the holy Spirit. This is the privilege of all who have embraced the gospel, and he said his work was the beginning of a marvelous work in the latter days. There is no fear regarding this work, nor for those who abide by the principles of the gospel, for it will lead them to eternal life.

#### ELDER G. F. RICHARDS.

Elder G. F. Richards said he had cause to be exceedingly joyful in the manifestation of the goodness of God to him and for the testimony of the truth of the work which he possessed. "I rejoice in my testimony of the truth of the mission of Joseph Smith, and it is the privilege of every man to obtain the same testimony. The Lord approves those who acknowledge their testimony through any and all obstacles and show by their lives that they own and acknowledge God, for we are in His image and have the attributes to attain perfection."

#### PRESIDENT F. S. BRAMWELL.

President F. S. Bramwell of the Union, Oregon, stake, was the next speaker. "I am rejoicing very forcibly, on this occasion of the vision seen by the ancient prophets, when they said that in the last days the house of the Lord should be built in the tops of the mountains, and that all things should flow unto it," he said. "The fulfillment of that prophecy was here and now, for Israel was gathered here from all nations. Whenever the people of the world became converted to the gospel the spirit of gathering comes upon them at once, and in following the promptings of the spirit they should flow unto it. When we look to our right, we behold the works of Mormonism; when we gather to praise the Lord we have the witness of the spirit, and we sing and praise God with the knowledge in our souls that the gospel is true and that God lives."

#### ELDER NEPHI JENSEN.

Nephi Jensen also expressed himself as much pleased with the spirit of the outdoor gathering, and with the practical workings of Mormonism. There is nothing that attracts the people so much as the preaching of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Every Latter-day Saint can give an answer to the question, Do you know that Jesus Christ lives? They do not hesitate; they do not stop to explain; with all the fervor in them, they answer, "Yes, I know that Christ lives, and that He is the Redeemer of the world." Let us be charitable and forgiving. The genius of the gospel of Christ was expressed in Christ's words to the multitude when he accused them of being "Go thy way and sin no more." It is not that you have sinned more, but that you sin more, and that all things should flow unto it.

#### ELDER RULON S. WELLS.

Thirty-six births were reported during the week; 19 males and 17 females. Sixteen deaths were reported: seven males and nine females. Seven were shipped here for burial.

There were reported during the week 15 cases of contagious and infectious diseases, consisting of three cases of scarlet fever, one case of diphtheria, one case of measles, three cases of meningitis, three cases of pneumonia, two cases of mumps and two cases of chickenpox.

One case of smallpox, four cases of scarlet fever and nine cases of diphtheria remain in quarantine.
