

MONUMENT TO GEN. D. H. WELLS

Family Will Dedicate One and Pay Tribute to His Memory On Monday.

PROGRAM AT CITY CEMETERY.

First Presidency Among Those Who Will Do Honor to His Name—Something of His Career.

Decoration day in Utah will be celebrated this year by the living descendants of one of the famous Utah pioneers and pathfinders of the way across the west, by the dedication of a splendid granite monument to his memory.

The dedicatory service will be a private affair of the Wells family, in honor of Daniel H. Wells, and will be conducted in the city cemetery, at the family burial plot Monday, May 29. At 2 p.m. o'clock the party will assemble at the residence where Mr. Wells died 14 years ago, and from there will proceed to the city cemetery on the Sixth street

Benediction.

The monument, which has been erected on the plot is of marble and granite, and is of a magnificent shaft, and is thus described by Mr. Junius F. Wells, son of the deceased:

"An Utah granite base is five and one-half feet square on a foundation of concrete six feet square. The main base is four feet wide and supports the inscription dia three feet square. Upon this rests the plinth of the column. The latter about six feet in height and circumference, surmounted by a capital two and one-half feet in diameter, and a polished sphere which is about six feet in circumference. The total height above the ground is 15 feet, four inches, and the weight is about nine tons. The significance, so far as can be said to possess any symbolism, is described as follows:

"The foundation of things, as life upon which a great superstructure may be raised, is represented by a square or cube, equal in its three dimensions; and as we have tamped in a solid square concrete foundation to this monument. Reared upon such a foundation, that which a man may become, in which he may be a column, a polished shaft, and the sphere, one worthy to be so represented may surely aspire to, is portrayed by the symbol of eternity—the perfect sphere, which begins or end. All these, the solid square, the polished shaft, the perfect sphere, are symbols of monument. That they might more prominently indicate the foundation, life and character, faith and hope of him, in whose honor the monument is reared, we have made the size of the base, the height and largest circumference of the column, and the circumference of the sphere exactly equal in feet and inches to his height, which was just under six feet."
