Salina Cruz, Mexico, Dec. 27 .- Declaring that the attitude of Secy. Knox toward him could not fail to be disapproved by all fair-minded people, and that he believed the secretary's judgment was warped by false reports from the American vice-consul at Ma magua, former President Jose Santos elaya endeavored, in an interview to day, to justify his treatment of the Americans, Cannon and Groce, as an act that any one in his position would have committed.

Zelaya debarked from the Mexican gunboat General Guerrero this afternoon and left tonight for Mexico City in a private car attached to the regular passenger train due in that city Wednesmorning

enger train due in that city Wednes-day morning. "I am going to Mexico City to remain for six months," said he. "If the cli-mate agrees with me, I will send or go for my family. If it does not agree with me, I will go to some place in Europe. I am going to Mexico City to thank President Diaz and Mexican of-ficials for their kindness to me." "The Guerrero, with Zelaya and his party on board, arrived outside the harbor last night, where the boat lay until this morning. A little after 8 °clock it steamed to the dock, and Zelaya appeared on deck to wave a greeting to a crowd of townspeople hat had gathered. He was accompa-net by Luis A. Cousin, his former sec-retary of war; by Robert C. Bowo, his friend and former jefe politico, and by several friends. "Cannon and Groce," Zelaya declared, "were engaged by the Conservative marty and were brought from Guate-ming by that party, which was work-ing hand-in-hand with Cabrera. The message which brought the shocking news of the dis-tressing condition in which our cap-tives arrived in Bluefields could have but just reached you, ere your directors had given instructions, through your state department, for the issuance of supplies for the subsistence of the Ze-laya sick and weary.

ADMIRAL KIMBALL CALLS ON MADRIZ UNOFFICIALLY

ON MADRIZ UNOFFICIALITY Managua, Dec. 27.-Rear Admiral William Wirt Kimball, in command of the American warships at Corlnto, ar-rived at Managua today on a special train. The admiral was accompanied by George T. Weitzel, secretary of the American legation at Panama, and by two naval aldes. The American offi-cers were in uniform, and the object of Admiral Kimball's visit was to pay an unofficial call on President Madriz. A great crowd gathered at the sta-tion and gave them a cordial greeting, after which they drove to a hotel in a presidential carriage. Several Amer-ical flags were displayed, and, although there was no demonstration, much excitement prevailed. It was runored that the visit might, mean the recognition of President Mad-is by the United States Admiral

excitement prevailed. It was rumored that the visit might. mean the recognition of President Mad-riz by the United States. Admiral Kimball however, was emphatic in his assertion that he called on the presi-dent only in his private capacity. He refused to permit the gorgeously-uni-formed aide, whom President Madriz had sent, to ride on the box of the presidential carriage. Ernesto Martinez, former finance minister, whose arrest was ordered on a charge of misapplication of public funds, has escaped to Granada. Joa-quin Passos, Zelaya's brother-in-law, is under arrest on a similar charge, while Joaquin Navas, a millionaire from Leon, also is in the hands of the authorities. He is charged with ob-taining \$30,000 of public money from Zelayans for surrender of the hide concessions, which were improperly granted to him. The arrest of other mon enriched at the expense of the country is imminent.

ZELAYA IS IN NO SENSE A POLITICAL FUGITIVE

A POLITICAL FUGITIVE Washington, Dec. 27.—While the state department declined to discuss the report that Mexico had pledged itself to prevent the return of former Presi-dent Zelaya to Nicaragua, Central American diplomats here scoffed at the story. It was pointed out that Zelaya is not a political fugitive; that he wasy and that, being now a private citizen, Mexico can have no jurisdiction over him. "Zelaya is free as air," said a diplomat. "He probably will not re main in Mexico for any length of time for there is a regular line of steamers sailing every two weeks from Vera Cruz for Havre, France, by way of Ha-vana. Because of the existing state of affairs, it is not likely that Mexico will insist upon Zelaya enjoying its hospitality any longer than he cares

His removal from the country in probability would be received with t satisfaction.⁴

ESTRADA ANXIOUS TO REACH AN UNDERSTANDING

REACH AN UNDERSTANDING Managua, Dec. 27.—President Mad-riz tonight received a telegram from Gen. Estrada in command of the revo-lutionists at Bluefields, in answer to his message of Dec. 22, expressing a desire to reach some understanding that would lead to the re-establish-ment of peace. Gen. Estrada reciprocates this senti-ment and declares his readiness to meet the proposition submitted by the president, half way. President Madriz, who was elated over the friendly statement said: "I will immediately arrange a meet-ing of peace commissioners of both sides to discuss terms. I am confi-dent of a satisfactory outcome."

But they feel the need of thousands of miles of rail-roads, which can progress but slowly as long as we have neither the money nor the experience.
