WEATHER REPORT.

Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 25.56 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 58 degrees; maximum, 70; minimum, 56; mean, 65, which is 6 degrees above normal.

Deficiency of daily mean temperature since Sept. 1, 73 degrees.

Deficiency of daily mean temperature since Jan. 1, 201 degrees.

Precipitation since the first of the month, .34 inch, which is .33 inch below the normal.

Deficiency in precipitation since Jan. 1, .36 inch.

Local forecasts for Salt Lake City and vicinity:

Partly cloudy and unsettled tonight and Saturday; possibly showers Saturday; cooler.

Forecasts for Utah made at Denver, Colo.:

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the North Pacific states, and central and lower Mississippi valley, and lowest over the southern plateau, northern Rocky mountain slope, extreme north-west and the B. N. W. territories.

Precipitation occurred over portions of Montana, southern California, western Texas and the B. N. W. territories. It was raining at times of morning report at El Paso, Texas, and at Helena, Montana. The largest amount of rain was at El Paso, Texas, 1.06 inch.

The temperature was generally slight except a rise of 10 degrees to 14 degrees over portions of Idaho, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri and the British North-west territories.

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ANOTHER SHOPLIFTER.

One More Woman in Disgrace for Stealing from Stores.

Last night the police arrested a woman who gave the name of Augusta Cottrell, on the charge of petty larceny. The police say she is a professional shop lifter and that she has been caught in the act of stealing from various stores in the city. She declares that her operations have extended over a period of many months and that hundreds of stolen articles were found in her house at 739 south First West street.

Yesterday afternoon the woman was in Z. C. M. I. and one of the clerks detected her in the act of walking off with a silk skirt. An officer was called and she was placed under arrest. At the police station it is said she admitted that she had been stealing from the store and that she had taken a lot of books and other articles from Savage's and from Johnson & Pratt's drug store. Last night Sergeant Hempel, armed with a search warrant, searched the woman's house and found a whole wagon load of stuff. It was taken to the station, where it will be held pending identification by the various owners. The collection consists of articles of almost every description. There were dressgowns in great quantity, fans, shoes, books and bric-a-brac. When asked why she stole the articles, she merely said she was hungry. She was booked for petty larceny and her bail fixed at \$100.

YELLOWSTONE RESERVE.

Government Survey Cuts Off a Million Acres of Choice Land.

It is understood the new survey cuts off about one million acres from the reserve and restores to entry many valuable tracts of grazing and agricultural lands now embraced in the reserve.
