MORE SCHOOL BOND NEEEDED

Board of Education Decides to Submit Proposition to the People, April 20.

FOR SITES AND BUILDINGS.

Twenty-Four Four Per Cents to the Total of a Quarter of a Million Asked.

The people of Salt Lake are to have an opportunity on April 20 of passing approval or disapproval on a proposition to further bond the city for \$250,000 in 24-year, 4 per cent bonds, the money to be used for the purchase of school sites and the erection of school buildings within the city limits.

The board of education decided to submit the bonding proposition to the people on April 20, at a meeting held last night. There were present Byron Cummings, C. S. Martin, M. J. Chessman, A. G. Glauque, W. J. Newman and J. Z. Hamilton. The resolution calling for the election was passed upon its first reading, as it had already been considered in executive session.

The text of the resolution follows: Whereas, an adjourned meeting of the board of education, held Feb. 7, 1907, the committee on buildings and grounds reported to this board that it was necessary to raise money for purchasing school sites for building, or purchasing one or more schoolhouses, and to furnish and equip the same, and supply the same with furniture, and necessary apparatus, and improve the grounds of the sites so purchased; and

Whereas, said committee on buildings and grounds further reported that the board was not in possession of sufficient funds for that purpose, or for any part thereof, and the said committee therein recommended that immediate steps be taken to call an election asking the taxpayers of the Salt Lake City school district for power to issue bonds in the amount of \$250,000 for the purpose of purchasing school sites, for building buildings, and for building said school buildings and supply the same with furniture and necessary apparatus; and

Whereas, the board of education adopted the said report and directed that immediate steps be taken for the purpose aforesaid;

Resolved, That the board of education do create an indebtedness of \$250,000 and to issue 24 bonds therefore of \$1,000 each, payable 24 years from the date of issue, with interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned, be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the city of Salt Lake in the year 1908.

That the president and clerk of this board shall cause to be published in the following newspapers, to be published in Salt Lake City, and having general circulation therein: Tribune, Herald, Intermountain, Republican, Deseret News, Telegram, and Post-Office, a notice signed by the clerk of the board, to the effect that the board of education has adopted the proposition to issue bonds in the following form:

"NOTICE OF SCHOOL BOND ELECTION."

"Office of the Board of Education of the City of Salt Lake, Utah, April 2, 1907. Notice is hereby given:

"First—That an election for the purpose of voting upon the issuing of bonds for school purposes will be held on Saturday, the 20th day of April, 1907, to vote upon the following question and proposition, to wit:

"That the board of education of Salt Lake City create an indebtedness of \$250,000 for the purpose of purchasing school sites, for building buildings, and for building said school buildings and supply the same with furniture and necessary apparatus; and

"That the board of education do create an indebtedness of \$250,000 and to issue 24 bonds therefore of \$1,000 each, payable 24 years from the date of issue, with interest at the rate of 4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned, be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the city of Salt Lake in the year 1908."

"The polls for this election will be held on Saturday, the 20th day of April, 1907, from 7 o'clock a. m. to 7 o'clock p. m.

"Second—That the names of the judges to conduct such election at each of the said polling places are as follows: First precinct, Harrison Spiers, E. M. Walker, Fred C. Sanford, Second precinct, W. P. Phelps, W. W. Anderson, Thomas B. Taylor, Third precinct, D. H. Harding, J. R. Grice, R. E. T. Taylor, Fourth precinct, E. L. Sloan, M. L. Cummings, C. H. Smythe, Fifth precinct, J. Z. Hamilton.

"Third—That the polls for such election will be held at 7 o'clock a. m. and close at 7 o'clock p. m.

"Fourth—That the aggregate amount of bonds proposed to be issued is \$250,000, divided into 24 bonds of \$10,000 each, and each of said bonds to run for twenty years from the date thereof.

"Fifth—That said bonds are proposed to be issued for the purpose of purchasing school sites, and for building upon such sites school buildings, and for supplying said new buildings with furniture, and necessary apparatus, and improving the said new sites so purchased."

"BOARD OF EDUCATION."

"That the president and clerk of this board are hereby authorized to sign the said notice of election and for the board of education.

"That in case the said proposition is approved by the electors and qualified voters of such election, that they sign and in that case the president and clerk of this board are authorized and directed to cause to be prepared necessary blanks for said bonds and to execute the same for the board of education."

"That the notice hereinbefore prepared be published in the daily newspapers aforesaid once each day, except Sunday, for not less than ten days before the said election, and that copies thereof plainly printed shall be posted at the polling places and in each of the said precincts, and that the said notice in each precinct shall be of the city for at least ten days prior to the time of said election."

"That the president of the board and the clerk thereof are hereby authorized and instructed to cause to be prepared the ballots to be used at such election, which said ballots shall be prepared upon the face the question submitted thereby to the taxpayers."

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS.

Besides the passing of the resolution for bonding the city, a few routine matters were considered. William Simons offered to sell to the board 24 rods of land at \$100 per acre, and the board accepted the same for \$2,400 to be paid on July 1, 1908. He also offered 24 rods more adjoining the land already sold, and the board accepted the same for \$2,400.

The buildings and grounds committee reported the purchase of a site on Ninth West, between Second and Third South streets, for a schoolhouse, the J. B. Walker estate having accepted \$500 in part payment. The balance of \$2,500 was recommended for payment after
