The following items are sent by Eider John Thorgeirson, from Thisile, Dec. 16: An interesting incident connected with the Icelandic mission is this: Rev. Mattias Jockumson, one of the leading European poets, is a native of Iceland. He appears, several years ago, to have become favorably influenced by the leachings of the Gospel. Three years ago or more, because of the true tenure of his sermons, he was assured that he would receive a lifelong pension, if he would only resign the pulpit, which he did. I understand that whenever Elder Johanneson, recently returned from the mission, visited him, the poet was al-ways ready and willing to assist him, telling him that he was doing a good work, and that God would bless him. I am informed that Mr. Jorkumson's sister-in-law is baptized into the Church, and that her husband, who is a lighthouse-keeper on the east coast of Iceland, is also a firm believer in the

Gospel. Mr. Jockumson has written several volumes of poems, dramas and trage-dies, etc., and has translated several of Shakespeare's plays, and "Frithlof's Saga," an interesting poem by the Swedish poet Essias Tegner. ## IN NEUCHATEL.

#### Six Elders Laboring There With Good Results.

The following is a letter from Elder J. Fred Evans, dated Chaux-de-Fonds, Switzerland, Nov. 18, 1963:

No doubt there are many people in the United States and in Europe also who wonder why so few French-speak-ing people have accepted the irus and everlasting Gospel. From my little ex-perience, I think that the fault lies in the fact that there have not been True, there have been missionaries here to preach to them and to give the people a chance to show what they can do. True, there have been missionaries in the French part of Switzerland but not nearly as many as the comparative population of the rities demands and for this reason the Saints are few and scattered, but those which have em-braced the Gospel are true and stead-

fast to the cause, Last May President Levi Young of the Swiss mission determined to give the French speaking people another chance; so, accordingly, he sent Elder Muir of Salt Lake and Elder Arbischer of Logan to Neuchatel, a beautiful city of 26,000 and situated upon a lake of the same name. These Elders being in their native land, were to pave the way for others to follow. Their efforts were quickly rewarded by Saints being found in many towns round about and a very fine branch was quickly formed and now frequent, well attended meetings are being held in Neuchatel itself, a city which formerly had the reputation of treating the Elders rathwell attended roughly but now is very friendly towards us.
