

SALT LAKE AND FOUR CITIES IN NEW LEAGUE

Guarantee Put Up by E. G. Farnsworth—Holee Butte, Great Falls and Helena.

Helena, Mont., March 16.—At a meeting held at the Grand Hotel in this city tonight steps were taken for the immediate organization of an intermountain baseball league. Five cities were represented at the meeting, as follows: Butte and Boise, by John S. Barnes; Salt Lake City, by E. G. Farnsworth; Great Falls, by H. H. Conroy; and Helena, by W. T. Hull.

The meeting was called to order by W. T. Hull, president of the Northwestern League, who immediately asked for the endorsement of the league. Mr. Farnsworth immediately moved the organization of an intermountain league, consisting of four or six cities, and said he was prepared to deposit a guarantee of \$500 for Salt Lake City. His motion was seconded by Mr. Barnes, who was similarly prepared. The motion was carried by a vote of 4 to 1.

Mr. Conroy of Great Falls stated that he had been instructed by the citizens of his city to vote for a state league or none at all. After explanations and exchange of opinion as to the relative merits of a state and intermountain league, Mr. Conroy finally refused to commit himself to either, and it was decided to drop Great Falls entirely.

Chairman Barnes then appointed the following committee to draw up a constitution and by-laws: John S. Barnes, W. T. Hull and E. G. Farnsworth. A meeting will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, at which the committee will report and at which it is expected the constitution and by-laws will be adopted. Other details, including election of officers, schedule, securing of grounds, etc., will be taken up and disposed of at the meeting tomorrow.

JOHNSON O K'S DESIGN FOR ANNUAL PASSES

Chicago, March 17.—President B. B. Johnson of the American League has placed his O. K. on a design for annual passes for President Taft and Vice President Sherman. Both are baseball enthusiasts and have been frequent visitors at major league games in the past.

The design is complicated. But two points will be made from the plan, after which it will be destroyed. The passes will be made on this ivory tablet which will be included in cases made of elephant's hide. On the back of the cases will be placed the monograms of the president and vice president carved by hand out of solid gold.

NEW MARATHON RUNNER.

Henri Saint Yves After Match With Longboat.

New York, March 17.—A new soccer afficionado over the Marathon course will arrive in New York tomorrow from France. He is Henri Saint Yves, who hopes to arrange a race for Longboat, Dorando, or perhaps Shubb. He also intends to enter the proposed Marathon derby for 1909 which will be held at the polo grounds in April. Saint Yves will be in charge of Al Cleveland, the Princeton trainer. Cleveland says the Frenchman has gone over the Olympic Marathon course in 2 hours, 31 minutes, 22 seconds, which is 20 minutes faster than the time made by Hays when the latter won the event after Dorando had collapsed.

RECORD IS BROKEN.

Madison Square Garden N. Y. March 16.—George V. Bonheur of the Irish-American Athletic union gave a grand exhibition of his prowess as a runner when he won the five-mile race at Madison Square Garden tonight in 21:39.25. This beats the best accepted record of 22:07.25, made by Tom Collins at the tugger championships here last year.

In the second trial, heat of the 30 yards high hurdle handicap, the Shaw of Dartmouth, from scratch, equaled the world's record of 1:15 seconds. In the final heat Shaw was beaten by a few inches, Dwight of Princeton, with 12 feet, winning. These few inches deprived Shaw of making a new world's record.

MORAN BEATS MURPHY.

New York, March 16.—Owen Moran the British featherweight pugilist, outpointed and outboxed Futuro Murphy, the Italian lightweight, tonight. This was the second meeting between these two. In their first bout Murphy, by a close vote of his hands so badly that he could not use it and Moran had practically his own way. Tonight Murphy and both hands in condition, but he failed to get the better of the Britisher, who at all stages has his superior both in the work and foot work. It was a fast, clean bout, which went the limit of ten rounds and, while no decision was given by the referee, there was no question as to the superiority of Moran.

Bowker was floored again in the tenth, and in the eleventh round he was sent down three times in succession. Near the close of the twelfth the Boston man delivered a telling right to the head, which sent Bowker to the floor for the last time. Through the champion was able to rise as the bell ended the fight. The decision was given to Delmont.

Bills Introduced Proposing Additional Compensation.

Washington, March 17.—Rural letter carriers will come in for some extra compensation during the Sixty-first Congress if the two bills recently introduced by Representatives Bates, (Pa.) and Humphreys, (Miss.) are enacted. Mr. Bates bill provides an additional allowance of \$100 per annum for subsistence. Mr. Humphreys would allow \$250 per annum additional for each rural carrier for the "purchase and maintenance of necessary horse, wagon and equipment."
