Irving W. Childs, a young millionaire of Brooklyn, son of the late William H. Childs, who was a prominent banker, caused to be published in several newspapers a notice to the effect that his wife, Gertrude, had left him and that he would no longer be responsible for her debts. His action has made public a remarkable story of domestic infidelity that the Childs family has vainly endeavored to suppress.

In Irving W. Childs' trouble with his pretty wife the latter has the sympathy of Evered Childs, her brother-in-law. For years the brothers have been estranged and only last spring Irving brought suit against Evered, who is his senior by over 20 years, to compel him to make an accounting of their father's estate.

The younger brother won this action and came into possession of \$425,000, accumulated income due him since his father's death. Irving, however, will not come into his share of the estate, which is estimated at \$2,000,000, until he is 25 years old. He is now 22.

Through his attorneys Mr. Gould's affidavit, making in the admission of Miss Mar's testimony, alleges that "monstrous" relations existed between Col. Cody and Miss Clemmons.

The affidavit also says that Mr. Gould has learned, on information and belief, that prior to their marriage Miss Clemmons made a confession to Miss Cody concerning her relation with Col. Cody.

Friends of Mrs. Gould say an order for a stay of proceedings undoubtedly would be made.

Howard Gould's controversy with his wife, Katharine Clemmons, who is suing him for separation, came to the fore again when the millionaire caused this advertisement to be inserted in the New York daily newspapers:

"All persons concerned are hereby notified that Mrs. Gould and myself are living separate and apart; that Mrs. Gould is furnished by me with funds sufficient for necessities and reasonable requirements, and that I will not be responsible for any purchases made or debts contracted by Mrs. Howard Gould, or any person acting for her."
