LOCAL BRIEFS.

There will be a ward dance, Friday evening, in the Twenty-second ward hall.

The state board of sheep commissioners is in session today, and attending to mostly routine business.

Prof. W. M. Stewart of the university training school will address parents residing in Sugar House ward this evening, in the local schoolhouse.

The Hisperian club will give its dance at the Unitarian hall next Wednesday evening Nov. 25. It was not given last Wednesday as planned.

An elaborate copper cornice has been placed on the new building of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, which is attracting complimentary attention.

Yesterday was payday for the department employees of the city. The payrolls for the first half of November amounting to \$3,175.85, were paid by the city treasurer.

There will be a special meeting of the Veterans' Volunteer Firemen at their hall, 271 Canyon road, at 8 p. m. tomorrow night. All members are respectfully invited to attend.

There are 10 applications for membership on the bulletin board of the University club. The club members will have been in college men admitted to the club during the month.

The white pillars for the new building of the information bureau have been set up in position, and as the edifice is now under cover, the interior work can be hurried to completion.

The university regents have referred the bids for insurance on the university buildings to the secretary of the board for classification and on his report, the board will select the bid to be accepted.

The Scottish Rite Masons are concluding their labor today, in Masonic hall. The Philanthropic and Chivalric degrees were conferred yesterday, and the convention closes this evening, with a big banquet and ball.

The Real Estate association held an interesting meeting yesterday over the lunch table at the Commercial club. They discussed the idea of publishing an improved map of Salt Lake City, and an improved schedule of rentals, sales, commissions and appraisals.

Mr. L. M. Olson, ex-mayor of Price, Utah, president of the Emery County Mercantile Co., is coming shortly to reside in Salt Lake with all his family. He has bought a lot on South State street and Mr. E. M. Powell of the Regan Realty company is building him a \$4,000 house.

Hon. William Jones of the British parliament was given a largely attended and very enjoyable reception last evening, by ex-Gov. Thomas at the latter's residence. The visitor leaves this afternoon for San Francisco where he will visit the various state educational institutions.

A fine quartet composed of Miss Emily Grimsdell, soprano, Miss Edna Dwyer, contralto, P. C. Graham, tenor, and Willard Squires, basso, is furnishing the vocal music for the Masonic consistory at this meeting. Mr. Peabody is in charge of the music, and is playing the organ himself.

A very creditable display of pottery made by the children of the training school of the state university, is on exhibition in the windows of Calloway, Block & Francis, on East Temple street. The little pottery workers have fashioned various articles in cute and

original design, and colored and glazed the same in an expert manner.

Dr. Henry Lamotte left yesterday for the east, with his objective point Philadelphia, where the naval and military academy teams will contend on the football field later in the month. The doctor is an enthusiastic supporter of the Middle, and thinks the way football experts are appointed to West Point is rather roughing it on Annapolis.

Lieut. Hines of the artillery corps, son of Supt. Hines of the Salt Lake waterworks, is studying in the artillery school at Fort Monmouth, and it is understood, is to be detailed as an instructor on finishing his course of study at the fort. The lieutenant will shortly be promoted to be first lieutenant, and on being given his detail is given by brevet the rank of the next higher grade.

Cannon is preparing examination papers covering a wide range of field operations and camp detail for a number of national guard officers, which will give a very good idea of what the officers of the state troops prepared for any duty that they may be called on to perform, whether in street fighting, field maneuvers, or any kind of duty that might be required in camp. Gen. Cannon believes that "in time of peace prepare for war."

The students of history will attend Dr. Kelsey's lecture on Pompeii tonight.

**GYPSIES ARRESTED.**  
Police Raid Camp on Banks of Jordan Today and Get Seven.

This morning Officers Johnston, Gatehouse, Sperry and Seager made a raid on a gypsy camp on Jordan river over the White Bridge, and arrested seven male members of the camp. It was next to impossible to book them as they possess unpronounceable names. The police declare that the camp is in a most filthy condition, and that the women were clothed in rags and running around in a half nude condition. It is charged that they have been stealing various articles from people who reside in that neighborhood, and that a man telephoned to the station and said that on his way to town, one of the children ran out to meet him and asked for a match. The man took some matches from his pocket and with them was a silver dollar. Upon seeing this the child grabbed the money and ran to the camp.

When searched at the police station, several hundred dollars were found on the prisoners. One of them had two half dollar pieces, one made in 1824 and the other in 1825. They will be tried before Judge Diehl tomorrow for vagrancy and petty larceny.
