ROCKY MOUNTAIN TREES FOR THE ARID PLAINS.

The division of forestry of the department of agriculture has decided to investigate early next summer the extreme eastern distribution of the Rocky Mountain trees. The information will be for the benefit of tree planters on the western plains, for the success of planting in these regions must largely depend upon introducing the trees which are naturally adapted to them. Heretofore a large proportion of the trees planted upon the plants have been eastern species, the effort of planters having been gradually to force the eastern species westward. There is reason to believe that a number of Rocky Mountain trees, accustomed to an arid nvironment, will be apt to succeed better in the more western plains re gion than the eastern species. This is articularly true of trees which grow aturally on lower elevations and which follow the streams for some dis-

tance into the plains.

The work will be done largely by collaborators of the dicision who are famil. far with the region. To each will be assigned a certain area in which, fol-lowing the trees eastward, he will study their habits of growth in varying situations.

BILL NO. 325 FOR AN ORDINANCE Creating the office of inspector of pro-visions for Salv Lake City, Utah, and defining the duties thereof.

Be and it is hereby ordained by the City Council of Sait Lake City, Utah: Section 1. That the office of Inspec-or of Provisions for Salt Lake City, Utah, is hereby created.

Sec. 2, it shall be the duty of the Inspector of Provisions to abov all orders of the Health Commissioner and the Board of Health. He shall perform all of the duties usually and ordinarily required of such an official, including the inspection of dairies, slaughter houses and all places of business contemplated by the ordinances of Salt Lake City, Utah, now in force, and make the proper tests to determine the purity of milk and other food products held for sale in Salt Lake City, Utah.,

Sec. 3. The salary of such shall be \$900 per year.
Sec. 4. Such officer shall give bonds. to the city with two or more sufficient sureties in the sum of \$1,000. Sec. 5. All ordinances and resolu-tions of the City Council in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect from its ap-
