

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

LEFT FOR ELKO. Officers Hyde and Hampton left this city for Elko, yesterday afternoon, by the 2:45 train. They had in their custody Dan Taylor, the last of the robbers captured by Messrs. Kimball & Judd, whom they were conducting to that place. Taylor states that the name of the robber not yet captured is Morgan, and that he sometimes goes under the name of Lee.

A HINT TO THE LADIES.—A lady residing in the 10th Ward of this city, informs us that on Wednesday night, when on her way home, after having attended the Theatre, while near the depot of the Utah Central, she was attacked by a man, who seemed to have come out of the station. He placed one hand upon her mouth, and showing a knife in the other, swore by G-d that he would cut her throat if she made the least noise or alarm. He then endeavored to throw her down, leaving no doubt of what his intentions were. She struggled for some time, and being a stout woman, prevented the scoundrel accomplishing his purpose, and approaching footsteps being heard the brute made tracks as quickly as possible. In her struggle nearly the whole of her clothing was torn from her person, and she reached home more dead than alive with fear and fatigue. The fellow who so dared her was dark and heavy set; had on a dark hat, no whiskers, and had several rings on his fingers.

This occurrence should be a warning to the ladies of this city not to walk out at night without an escort. For years after the settlement of the Latter-day Saints here it was perfectly safe for either man or woman to travel at all hours of the day or night in this or any other place in the Territory; but in those days what is nicknamed "civilization," with its vices, was unknown; "Mormonism," pure and undefiled, reigned, and all was peace and security. But as one of our Eastern contemporaries—the Missouri Republican, of the 10th instant, justly says:

"Such a system of religion and morals can only exist when isolated from the rest of the world."

Our contemporary is a far better 'Mormon' than we gave him credit for; he is evidently in possession of the light of the spirit. We could hardly have said the same of him. He also refers to certain official acts, which have taken place here, and to the influence of Protestant missions, emigration, mining, etc., and is evidently under some trepidation about the future of "Mormonism." It seems to fascinate the pure word of "Mormonism" will become extinct, but we wish to calm all our friend's apprehensions, and do assure him, that while the institutions he refers to are trying to exist in our midst, the "Mormons" regard them with the utmost indifference, and would be entirely ignorant of the "mighty revolutions and changes" the said institutions are effecting. We did not for the announcements to that effect made in the pages of newspapers, published too far from Utah to permit them or their editors to know anything whatever as to the real condition of "Mormonism" and the "Mormons."

SANDWICH ISLANDS SUGAR.—We learn that a car load of sugar, consigned to Bro. Geo. Nebeker, has arrived in this city, from Lale, Oahu, Sandwich Islands. We have not seen the article, but are assured that it is superior to any previously forwarded hither from that place. It is gratifying to see the success with which this branch of industry is being prosecuted by our co-religionists there. We think that all the sugar manufactured on the church island there ought to find a ready sale in this Territory. The people of Utah should take a pleasure in encouraging the enterprise of the brethren on that distant "isle of the sea," and especially when, in doing so, they can obtain as good an article and at as low a figure as in any other market.

PROVO.—Elder A. F. McDonald, writing from Provo on the 14th inst., says: "Col. Morrow, from Camp Douglas, is at Fort Rawlings holding Court Martial. Himself and fellow officers express themselves as being very anxious to identify the parties who were engaged in the late 'raid.' Mayor Smoot offered the use of the Court House as being more convenient for the attendance of witnesses; orders, however, had been received to hold the Court at Fort Rawlings."

GETTING NO BETTER.—The Idaho Statesman of the 10th, under the heading of "Simply another man killed," has the following:

"We are informed that a man named Malloy was killed by a Chinaman on Monday night, at Idaho City. Malloy had broken in on or was engaged in breaking into the Chinaman's house for the purpose of robbery, when John defended his property by killing him. Malloy was out in about twenty places, which shows that a struggle had taken place. Sufficient evidence was found to make the Chinaman's story appear plausible."

TURNED STATE'S EVIDENCE.—The Reno Crescent, of November 11th, says:

"It is reported that the railroad robbers are confined separately, and that every last one of them has turned State's evidence, each anxious to save his own bacon at the expense of his companions."

RETURN ROCK.—A few days since we published a dispatch from Pleasant Grove, Utah County, announcing the accidental killing, on the 11th inst., of a young man by the falling of a tree. We are in receipt of a letter from Brother D. M. Smith, which gives some particulars of the occurrence. Deceased was chopping a tree when the thought struck him that if he continued he would get hurt and asked a companion to finish felling it, who readily assented. He was moving away when the tree unexpectedly fell in the direction where he was, crushing him to death. He seemed, for several weeks previous to the accident, to have a presentiment of his approaching end, having expressed himself several times, in conversation, to that effect. The writer of the letter says he was a young man of strictly upright character and was universally respected among his acquaintances. He was a student in his habits. Deceased was born in Franklin County, Pa., and was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in 1863, at Farmington, Davis Co. He leaves a widowed mother to mourn his loss.

LEVAN.—Brother James Wilson, of Levan, Juab county, writes on the 14th inst., that the settlement is progressing, good houses are being built and other improvements made by the citizens. A good Sunday school is in operation; and in two weeks a day and evening school will be started in the New Meeting House, which will then be finished. Co-operation is flourishing. On the 1st instant stock was taken and a dividend of thirty per cent in six months was declared.

DEATH.
At Fort Herriman, October 23rd, 1879, John J. Stocking, after a long and painful illness, aged 54 years and 6 months.
Bro. Stocking was baptized into the Church in Feb. 1861, by E. D. Woolley, in Westfield, Mass. He moved to Nauvoo on the 20th of October, 1844, and arrived in Salt Lake City in 1846. He was a member of one of the Quorum of Seventy for many years, and was ordained a High Priest. He was a Companion to the Bishop of Fort Herriman, and has always been true and faithful to his religious and civil duties, and died in the faith and awaits a glorious resurrection.
In this city, on the night of the 18th instant, of teaching and inflammation of the brain, Thomas Hodgins, son of Thomas and Annie Williams, aged ten months and two days, died. Funeral services took place this morning at ten o'clock. Suitable addresses were delivered by Elders Henry W. Naisbitt and George Q. Cannon.
